

Hearing Aid Services

Comprehensive hearing aid related services are available to children diagnosed with permanent childhood hearing loss (PCHL).

Who should be referred to the CCSHCN Hearing Aid Services program?

Children who are in need of new or replacement hearing aids and want to receive hearing aids and related services through a CCSHCN audiologist and wish to receive Otology care outside of the Commission's clinical Otology program.

What audiology services are available through the CCSHCN Hearing Aid Services program?

Licensed, certified audiologists conduct periodic comprehensive hearing evaluations, hearing aid checks, hearing aid repairs and hearing aid evaluations according to ASHA best practices guidelines. Comprehensive reports are provided to the managing otolaryngologist on an on-going basis; additional follow up testing will be completed at physician request.

Providers

Who qualifies for services through the Commission for Children with Special Health Care Needs?

All children (birth to 21 years) who are residents of Kentucky.

What is the cost for Hearing Evaluation Services?

There is no charge to the family for initial evaluation for children referred based on failed newborn hearing or school screening; Medicaid rates charged to others; sliding fee scale utilized.

How do I contact the CSHCN to make a referral?

Please call the Commission office nearest to you. Audiologists are on staff in 10 state of the art, child friendly facilities.



Who should be referred for hearing testing?

- Children who meet criteria as at risk for late onset or progressive hearing loss (including chronic middle ear problems);
- Children being tracked by school screening/hearing conservation and the Early Hearing Detection Intervention (EHDI) programs; and,
- Children who have been diagnosed with permanent hearing loss (PCHL) may qualify for ongoing evaluation services through the Audiology Program at CSHCN.

What testing is available?

Licensed, certified audiologists conduct comprehensive hearing evaluations on newborns, infants and children of all ages including:

ABR (Auditory Brainstem Response)

OAE (Otoacoustic Emissions)

Immittance Measures (Tympanometry and Acoustic reflex testing)

Behavioral Audiometry (Visual reinforcement; conditioned play; conventional audiometry including speech perception testing)



Test results and written report provided to referring physician within 48 hours of scheduled appointment; follow up testing scheduled at physician request.
