Providers using videos within their lecture course, must include the video title, production date, and submit a written summary of the content of the video.

4. **Curriculum vita** for instructors that shows their qualifications for teaching an HIV/AIDS course. (No more than **ten**-pages per instructor.)

STATUTORY AUTHORITY: KRS 194A.050, 211.090(3), EO 2004-726

Section 7. Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) and Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) Surveillance.

- (1) Physicians and Medical Laboratories shall report:
 - (a) 1. A Positive test result for HIV infection including a result from:
 - a. Elisa;
 - b. Western Blot;
 - c. PCR;
 - d. HIV antigen; or
 - e. HIV culture;
 2. CD4+ assay including absolute CD4+ cell counts and CD4+%;
 3. HIV detectable Viral Load Assay; and
 4. A positive serologic test result for HIV infection; or
 - (b) A diagnosis of AIDS that meets the definitions of AIDS established within the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines and reported in the:
 1. "Adult HIV/AIDS Confidential Case Report Form"; or
 2. "Pediatric HIV/AIDS Confidential Case Report Form".
- (2) An HIV infection or AIDS diagnosis shall be reported within five (5) business days and, if possible, on the "Adult HIV/AIDS Confidential Case Report form" or the "Pediatric HIV/AIDS Confidential Case Report form".
 - (a) A report for a resident of Jefferson, Henry, Oldham, Bullitt, Shelby, Spencer, and Trimble Counties shall be submitted to the HIV/AIDS Surveillance Program of the Louisville-Metro Health Department.
 - (b) A report for a resident of the remaining Kentucky counties shall be submitted to the HIV/AIDS Surveillance Program of the Kentucky Department for Public Health, or as directed by the HIV/AIDS project coordinator.
- (3) A report for a person with HIV infection without a diagnosis of AIDS shall include the following information:
 - (a) The patient's full name;
 - (b) Date of birth, using the format MMDDYY; and
 - (c) Gender;
 - (d) Race;
 - (e) Risk factor, as identified by CDC;
 - (f) County of residence;
 - (g) Name of facility submitting report;
 - (h) Date and type of HIV test performed;
 - (i) Results of CD4+ cell counts and CD4+%;
 - (j) Results of viral load testing;
 - (k) PCR, HIV culture, HIV antigen, if performed;
 - (l) Results of TB testing, if available; and
 - (m) HIV status of the person's partner, spouse or children.
- (4) Reports of AIDS cases shall include the information in subsections (1) through (3) of this section; and
 - (a) The patient's complete address;
 - (b) Opportunistic infections diagnosed; and
 - (c) Date of onset of illness.
- (5)
 - (a) Reports of AIDS shall be made whether or not the patient has been previously reported as having HIV infection.
 - (b) If the patient has not been previously reported as having HIV infection, the AIDS report shall also serve as the report of HIV infection.

Kentucky HIV Direct Services

Mission: To enhance access to and retention in primary health care and support services for qualifying Kentuckians (clients) living with HIV disease.

Goals of Kentucky HIV Direct Services

1. Client self sufficiency (to the extent possible) through good care plan monitoring and holistic support
2. Prevent duplication of health and support services among providers
3. Education about HIV disease transmission and health choices
4. Ongoing HIV disease education to the general and health care communities
5. Efficient and effective use of resources

Structure of Kentucky HIV Direct Services

Kentucky Care Coordination Program (KHCCP) - A network of regional sites by which clients may access quality primary health care and other support services in or near the communities in which they live. In order to access direct services in Kentucky, you must enroll in the KHCCP

Kentucky AIDS Drug Assistance Program (KADAP) – Provides clients with HIV/AIDS related medications

Kentucky Health Insurance Continuation Program (KHICP) – Assists clients with maintaining pre-existing private health insurance

Funding

Kentucky receives federal funding through the Ryan HIV/AIDS Treatment and Modernization Act of 2006, and also non-federal funds through the State of Kentucky

Eligibility Criteria (Proof required)

- Household income must be 400% or less of the current federal poverty level
- Must be a resident of Kentucky
- Must be HIV positive
- You cannot be eligible for similar assistance from another payer source

The overall intent of the services programs is to provide clients with a continuum of care utilizing existing community-based services to the greatest extent possible. See Kentucky's HIV Care Coordinator Regions →

AIDS Interfaith Ministries of Kentuckiana (AIM) is committed to people living with HIV/AIDS by providing spiritual, nutritional and emotional support in a community building context, which is non-judgmental and life affirming in approach. AIM seeks to be a bridge between the HIV/AIDS and faith communities. AIM provides pastoral care and counseling for individuals, couples, families and groups. Hospital, home and nursing facility visitation is provided as well as funeral services and grief counseling. AIM provides a Food Closet inclusive of personal care items and household cleaning supplies, life skills educational workshops, spiritual retreats, a monthly fellowship dinner, and volunteer services through the AIM Care Teams. <http://www.aimkyonline.org/> 607 E. AIDS Volunteers of Northern Kentucky (AVNK) has two support groups that meet on Sunday evenings, one for HIV-challenged persons, and the other for their support system. There is a monthly dinner and social on the fourth Tuesday of the month. Trained volunteers offer services and support to people affected with HIV and their family members. (513) 483-5757

AIDS Volunteers, Inc. (AVOL) (located in Lexington) provides housing and supportive services to over 400 low-income men and women living with HIV/AIDS in over 70 counties in central and eastern Kentucky. AVOL operates two housing facilities: Solomon House, a long-term permanent community residence for people with AIDS, and Rainbow Apartments, a small complex of furnished units for people living with HIV/AIDS, who are transitioning from homelessness to permanent housing. AVOL provides free HIV testing as well as HIV prevention education and outreach to those at-risk in our communities. AVOL also serves as an important link connecting those newly diagnosed and those out of care to medical treatment and other healthcare resources. (859) 225-3000 <http://www.avolky.org/>

Bluegrass Care Clinic (BCC). The University of Kentucky Division of Infectious Diseases has provided a continuum of HIV primary care from diagnosis to end of life to over 1,000 persons from central and eastern Kentucky since 1990. A team of physicians, recognized for their treatment of HIV disease and board certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine with subspecialty certification in Infectious Diseases, staffs the Bluegrass Care Clinic. In addition to providing patient care, these physicians are actively engaged in HIV teaching, training, and research, and serve as co-investigators for all University of Kentucky HIV clinical trials. Physicians are aided by nurses, pharmacists and other clinicians to deal with the complex management of infectious diseases. The Bluegrass Care Clinic's mission is to provide a continuum of high quality, state-of-the-art, multi-disciplinary HIV primary care in a compassionate, culturally sensitive manner. Our goal is to achieve 100% access to HIV primary care with 0% socioeconomic disparity in health outcomes. Bluegrass Community Health Center (BCHC) is a non-profit Federally Qualified Health Center with two Lexington clinic sites. The health center provides patient-centered preventive and primary healthcare, including HIV testing, for pediatric, adult, and geriatric patients. BCHC provides services to the uninsured and accepts Medicaid, Medicare and many private insurances. Most of BCHC patients are charged on a sliding fee scale based on the family size and income (federal poverty guidelines). BCHC was originally established in 2001 with a federal 330 health center grant to serve local farm workers. In 2007, additional grant funding awards allowed an expansion to serve the greater community, including uninsured patients and people experiencing homelessness. BCHC's dedication to serving a diverse population encouraged the employment of many bilingual employees to supplement telephone interpreting services. BCC has two sites: 151 N. Harlan Countians for a Health Community is a coalition of healthcare providers, consumers, and other interested agencies whose purpose is to improve healthcare in Harlan County. (606) 573-6115

Hazard Perry County Community Ministries is located in Hazard. Their purpose is to meet community needs through supportive services (outreach and case management), crisis aid, homeless shelter, transitional housing and childcare. (606) 436-2662 <http://www.hpccm.org>

Heartland CARES, Inc., located in Paducah is a non-profit organization serving people with HIV and AIDS in the Western Kentucky and Southern Illinois regions. The mission is to provide various components of care needed for persons living with HIV and AIDS regardless of ethnicity, gender, religious, beliefs, sexual orientation, or ability to pay, and to provide education and prevention to the general public to help stop the spread of HIV and STDs. Medical services are primarily supported through Ryan White Part C funding. The clinic also has numerous supporting services, which include Ryan White Title II Care Coordinator Program, HOPWA Grant Emergency Assistance, Supportive Housing Grant Assistance, SAMHSA-CSAT Grant, HOPWA SPNS and HOME Grant. Matthew 25 AIDS Services, Inc. located in Henderson is a Ryan White CARE Act Parts B and C and CDC Prevention PA04064 Grantee. They are a provider of primary health care to PWHIV and LWA, in Daviess, Henderson, Union and Webster counties. Services include medical case management and referral, a buddy program, literature, spiritual support and referral, financial assistance and referral, a speakers' bureau, support groups (positive, family and friends), transportation and prevention education for the community and medical professionals. Moveable Feast (MFL) is a nutritional support program, serving people living with HIV disease and their dependent children living in the Lexington/Fayette County area. Clients receive social support and a hot, freshly cooked dinner five days a week. MFL also provides in-home HIV testing, and serves as a referral source to other ASOs in the region. North Central Area Health Education Centers (AHEC) recruits individuals from Hispanic communities, provides training, and utilizes them to conduct HIV prevention activities in their communities. AHECs in Lexington (covering 5 counties) and Covington (covering 4 counties) currently conduct outreach in Hispanic communities, provide HIV testing, and conduct two community level intervention (Juntos and Promotores de Salud). A third AHEC in Louisville conducts similar activities with African-American communities. Tri-State Alliance (TSA) is a not-for-profit social service/education organization that serves gays, lesbians and bisexuals in Southwestern Indiana, Northwestern Kentucky and Southeastern Illinois. TSA was formed in 1980 to meet the changing needs of the region's gay and lesbian populations. TSA has a variety of committees and events that work to meet these needs. Major events sponsored by the group include the gay and lesbian youth prom, the summer pride picnic, the AIDS Art Auction and the AIDS Christmas Project (see <http://www.aidsholidayproject.org/>). TSA coordinates the regional LGBT Youth Group, HIV prevention targeting the gay community, and Lesbian Health Project services. The gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and straight-supporting allies who volunteer for TSA continue to serve the region's LGBT community and its changing needs." <http://tsagl.org>

University of Cincinnati Hospital, Holmes Clinic located in Cincinnati, Ohio is the Infectious Disease Center for the University of Cincinnati Hospital. Holmes Clinic provides medical services to individuals diagnosed with HIV/AIDS and is funded primarily through Ryan White funds. Holmes Clinic provides these services to individuals from several states, and a significant percentage of individuals diagnosed with HIV/AIDS and living in Northern Kentucky use Holmes Clinic for their infectious disease care. In addition, the University of Cincinnati Health Infectious Diseases is now providing outpatient care for the prevention of HIV infection in high-risk adults. This FDA-approved, once-a-day pill, taken for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), combined with safer sex practices in both heterosexual and gay adults, reduces the risk of sexually acquired HIV infection. UC Health is now scheduling patient appointments once a month at our West Chester campus for those interested in participating in this PrEP regimen. Ongoing care includes monitoring for HIV and drug safety every three months, along with strict adherence to recommended dosing and counseling. Call (513) 475-8585 to schedule an appointment. No referral is needed.

The University of Cincinnati Emergency Room also has a grant to conduct HIV testing and counseling services
