

KENTUCKY OPIOID RESPONSE EFFORT

KORE's mission is to expand and sustain an equitable recovery-oriented system of care and reduce opioid-related overdose deaths in the Commonwealth of Kentucky by increasing access to evidence-based prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery support services.

Led by the Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental, and Intellectual Disabilities (**DBHDID**) within the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, KORE is federally-funded through formula grants distributed by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

NALOXONE SAVES LIVES

Naloxone (Narcan) is a safe medication that reverses opioid overdose by attaching to opioid receptors in the brain and blocking the effects of opioids. This allows an individual to resume breathing.

In partnership with the **Department for Public Health** and the **KY Pharmacists Association**, a statewide naloxone program distributes free naloxone to Kentuckians since 2018.

SYRINGE SERVICE PROGRAMS (SSPs)

SSPs reduce HIV and hepatitis C and connect people with resources like treatment, health care, and housing resources. KORE provides grants to 22 SSPs to facilitate these connections.

HARM REDUCTION

Harm reduction is a set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing negative consequences associated with substance use.

MEDICATIONS FOR OPIOID USE DISORDER (MOUD)

MOUD saves lives. Methadone and buprenorphine reduce illicit drug use and fatal overdose by over 50%, as well as improve quality of life.

Methadone **Treatment**

KORE serves as a payor of last resort for uninsured individuals needing licensed residential. intensive outpatient. methadone treatment. The Treatment Access Program served has 5,172 individuals and the Methadone Access Program has served 1,074 individuals.

INTEGRATED PRIMARY **CARE + OUD TREATMENT**



KORE-funded programs integrate OUD services into diverse health care settings and meet people where they are at. Settings include Federally Qualified Health Centers, Primary Care Clinics, and Rural Health Clinics. The KY Primary Care Association partners on this initiative.

FAMILY SERVICES

KORE funds **START, TAP** and **KSTEP** program expansion to integrate **OUD** treatment for families involved with child welfare. 575 individuals have been served...

BRIDGE TO TREATMENT

Hospital Bridge Clinics and inpatient consultation services have served 9,160 individuals by beginning SUD treatment, including MOUD, in the hospital.

MOBILE TREATMENT



Mobile treatment in rural and urban settings provides engagement to communities with high rates of overdose and disparities in treatment access.

QUICK RESPONSE TEAMS



QRTs provide overdose follow-up and engagement with survivors and their family. KORE-funded teams operate in 33 counties and have served 1,423 individuals.

RECOVERY

RECOVERY COMMUNITY CENTERS

RCCs provide centralized resources for community-based recovery supports. Over 4,000 clients have been served.

RCCs provide peer support, mutual aid, advocacy, and linkage to housing, education, employment, and transportation.






RCCs are not residences or treatment centers. RCCs serve as local hubs of communitybased support.

RCCs are led by people with lived experience.



KORE funds 11 RCCs and 4 youth drop-in centers.



ACCESS TO RECOVERY

Access To Recovery (ATR) has supported 2,229 individuals in building recovery capital by assisting with supports such as clothing, transportation, and housing. Clients reported a 30 percent increase in recovery capital.

BUILDING RECOVERY CAPITAL

Recovery is a process of change through which people improve their health and wellness, live self-directed lives, and strive to reach their potential. Recovery capital is the total resources that a person has to move toward recovery. KORE-supported programs help build recovery capital, including:

REENTRY SUPPORT

The Department of Corrections' Reentry Employment Program Administrators and Re-entry Coordinators have provided re-entry and employment supports to 4.149 justice-involved individuals.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

The Strategic Initiative for Transformational Employment (SITE) individuals to job training, recovery-friendly has linked 829 employment, and/or recovery supports. Staff have engaged with over **2,500** employers to provide education on transformational employment.



The Kentucky Recovery Housing **Network** was established to certify quality housing using the National Alliance of Recovery Residence standards.

84 recovery housing beds that support residents' access MOUD and 18 new Oxford Houses have been established.

MUTUAL AID + YOUNG PEOPLE IN RECOVERY (YPR)



SMART Recovery and Double Trouble in Recovery evidence-based mutual aid groups where people help one another resolve and manage problems with addiction.

YPR's mission is to provide life skills and peer support to help people recover and reach their potential. established 8 chapters.

INFRASTRUCTURE

INFRASTRUCTURE



Infrastructure builds and equips communities' opioid response capacity by decreasing stigma, using data to drive decision making, fostering quality services, and expanding the provider network.



JUDICIAL

The Administrative Office of the Courts' RESTORE program educates and trains court personnel. Over **2,400** court staff trained, including over **130** judges.

STUDENTS

Three Kentucky medical schools are providing a range of training to medical, pharmacy, and behavioral health students.

PROVIDER TRAINING



- Tobacco Cessation for pregnant persons
- DATA 2000 Waiver training for buprenorphine prescribing
- Assessing and Managing Suicide Risk Training for Substance Use Providers

PEERS

Peer Support Specialists and supervisors receive training in person-centered recovery planning. Specialized peers are hired and trained for Service Members, Veterans, and their families. Peers are located in hospitals & primary care; domestic violence shelters; mobile & crisis treatment; RCCs; & SSPs.

ACCOMODATIONS

Deaf & Hard of Hearing reimbursement services are available for providers.



CHILD WELFARE

The Department for Community Based Services trains staff to serve families impacted by OUD. Over 1,400 child welfare staff and foster parents trained.

PARTNERS

The **Recovery Champions** Curriculum, developed with the Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation, provides **OUD training** to non-clinical partners.

EQUITY

KORE partnered with the Opioid Response
Network to provide training and technical
assistance to improve equitable access to
services. The program was also part of a
national learning collaborative to address
racial health disparities, focusing specifically
on gaps in SUD services.

COMMUNICATIONS

Communications initiatives focus on education to the general public, stigma reduction, overdose prevention and awareness of resources through targeted media outreach.
