BHCDP Continues to Expand and Provide Critical Support to Participants

I am pleased to present the second annual report on the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP), created by Senate Bill 90 in 2022 to enhance treatment access for justice-involved individuals. The Administrative Office of the Courts collects data on participants' progress and submits this annual report to the General Assembly.

Since its launch in 2023, BHCDP has steadily expanded. It successfully launched in eight pilot counties that year – Letcher, Madison, Clark, Pulaski, Hopkins, Christian, Oldham and McCracken. In 2024, implementation continued in Daviess, Greenup and Kenton. Kenton County completed the final phase on May 1. This milestone marks full implementation across all original pilot sites.

Throughout 2024, BHCDP strengthened its services to better support participants. Emergency Barrier Relief funds, distributed in partnership with the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program, helped participants meet immediate needs, allowing them to focus on recovery. Kentucky Adult Education continued to provide invaluable educational and career resources. Partnering with YourPath as the statewide assessor improved the screening process, and the Department for Medicaid Services' new reimbursement rates expanded access to recovery housing.

Building on this progress, BHCDP expanded beyond its initial pilot counties. In August of 2024, Henry and Lewis counties implemented the program, benefiting from their proximity to existing sites. Wayne, Warren, Johnson and Russell counties followed in September and October. Expansion discussions continue, and more jurisdictions are expected to join in 2025.

This report outlines BHCDP's impact, including eligibility assessments, success rates and post-program recidivism data. These insights are critical in evaluating the program's effectiveness and future growth.

BHCDP continues to provide essential treatment, case management and education to individuals in need. I encourage you to review this report, highlighting the meaningful difference this program is making across Kentucky. I look forward to its continued success.



Collaboration Key to BHCDP Success

It is my privilege to share this year's report on the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP). Since its establishment under Senate Bill 90 in 2022, BHCDP has provided justice-involved individuals with greater access to treatment and rehabilitation services, offering them a chance for meaningful change.

The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) has worked closely with the Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities and Kentucky Adult Education to ensure the program's continued success. This collaboration has been instrumental in expanding BHCDP's reach and enhancing its impact.

A key role of the AOC has been compiling and analyzing data from Pretrial Services, prosecutors, treatment providers and Kentucky Adult Education. This report presents key insights, including participant demographics, eligibility determinations, housing and treatment data and education outcomes. These findings are essential to evaluating the program's impact and guiding future improvements.

Early data indicates that BHCDP is making a real difference in the lives of participants. I encourage you to review this report and share its findings with colleagues and stakeholders.

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A Year in Review

In 2023, the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) created by Senate Bill 90 (SB 90), successfully launched in eight of the eleven pilot counties: Letcher, Madison, Clark, Pulaski, Hopkins, Christian, Oldham, and McCracken. In 2024, BHCDP's implementation journey continued into the remaining pilot counties of Daviess, Greenup, Kenton. Final implementation occurred May 1, 2024, in Kenton County. It has been a year of developments and accomplishments for BHCDP and its participants.



Highlights of 2024

In conjunction with the implementation of SB 90 in the remaining pilot sites, BHCDP continued to grow by offering BHCDP participants new opportunities as well as much needed crisis assistance. The availability of Emergency Barrier Relief funds, distributed in partnership with Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP), provided participants with crisis funding to meet their most immediate needs and enabled them to focus on recovery. Kentucky Adult Education continued to assist participants with invaluable educational, training, and career resources. Partnering with YourPath, the new statewide assessor, brought uniformity and efficiency to the initial screening process of potential participants, thus stimulating BHCDP's continued growth. Additionally, the Department for Medicaid Services implemented reimbursement rates for BHCDP participants in recovery housing, which provided participants with residential treatment options.

Emergency Barrier Relief Funds

The Emergency Barrier Relief Funds have assisted participants over 300 times with relief from a variety of obstacles to their recovery, including but not limited to, receiving funds for housing assistance, utility payments, and car repairs. Participants can receive up to \$2,000 in funds, if determined necessary, through allocations from the Opioid Abatement Trust Fund. One of the most successful utilizations of the Emergency Barrier Relief Funds has been towards transportation needs for participants.

Statewide Assessor

In 2023, approximately 300 clinical assessments of potential participants were completed. In 2024, over 940 clinical assessments were completed. Recognizing the necessity of increasing capacity and uniformity in statewide clinical assessments, BHDID contracted with YourPath, a recovery focused business, as it's Statewide Clinical Assessor. In a short amount of time, YourPath hired staff and mapped community resources, which allowed for screenings of potential participants to take place at greater frequency. YourPath has completed 696 clinical screenings for pretrial eligible potential participants and participants referred from prosecutors.

Reentry and Rehabilitation Branch

Kentucky Adult Education (KAE) was reorganized in June 2024, as BHCDP's educational requirements moved under the Reentry and Rehabilitation Branch. Contracts were successfully put in place that allowed KAE the ability to fund a myriad of life-changing opportunities for participants, such as equipment and tuition payment for their educational advancement. . They also offer additional barrier relief for employment and educational opportunities.

Recovery Housing

The Department for Medicaid Services (DMS) was also very active in 2024 with their statutory task of developing reimbursement rates for participants in recovery housing. The Department for Medicaid Services contracted with the Fletcher Group to implement a pilot program to provide services bundled in a weekly rate to Recovery Houses for individuals with a substance use disorder (SUD).

Expansion

The successful launch of all pilot counties also allowed the implementation team the ability to identify future

plans for BHCDP and analyze jurisdictions where case navigators and resources could potentially expand. The team also evaluated the pilot sites that had shared districts and circuits that had interest in becoming additional pilot sites.

Henry and Lewis Counties were the first additional counties to implement BHCDP in areas outside of the first eleven counties selected by the Supreme Court. Since both jurisdictions had neighboring counties, whose judges, commonwealth attorneys, and public advocates had already been a part of BHCDP's implementation, Henry and Lewis were a natural choice for expansion.

BHCDP continued to expand in September and October 2024 as Wayne, Warren, Johnson, and Russell counties joined the team. Each of those counties' key players were eager for their communities and courtrooms to experience the benefits of SB 90. Expansion talks continue and implementation partners are confident that more jurisdictions will come on board in 2025.

We will highlight some of these accomplishments throughout the various sections of this publication.

I am exceedingly honored to Chair the SB 90 BHCDP Advisory Council and work alongside the dedicated state and local leaders to make transformational changes to all struggling justice-involved Kentuckians, getting them out of the system, provide them with services such as outpatient and inpatient treatment, medications for addiction and mental health treatment, case management, educational and job training, and recovery supports. If the participant adheres to and completes the treatment plan outlined by a behavioral health provider, their charges will be dropped, changing the trajectory of their lives. It is my belief that provider services and intervention shortly after arrest will lead to healthier outcomes for the participant and the Commonwealth as a whole. Kentucky has increased the number of designated communities as "Recovery Ready" to 21 counties representing nearly 1.5 million Kentuckians. The Office of Drug Control continues to annually award almost \$6 million to assist pregnant and parenting women fighting addiction and every year increases the distribution of Narcan. We have worked with thousands of employers on hiring and retaining those in recovery. This not only reduces the burden of addiction for those struggling, but it also boosts workforce participation, reduces crime and keeps Kentucky families intact. Our continued work through SB 90's BHCDP is a critical part of our overall work of offering individuals an alternative to incarceration, increasing opportunities for treatment, creating a better, safer Kentucky through second chances.

Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program Eligibility by the Numbers



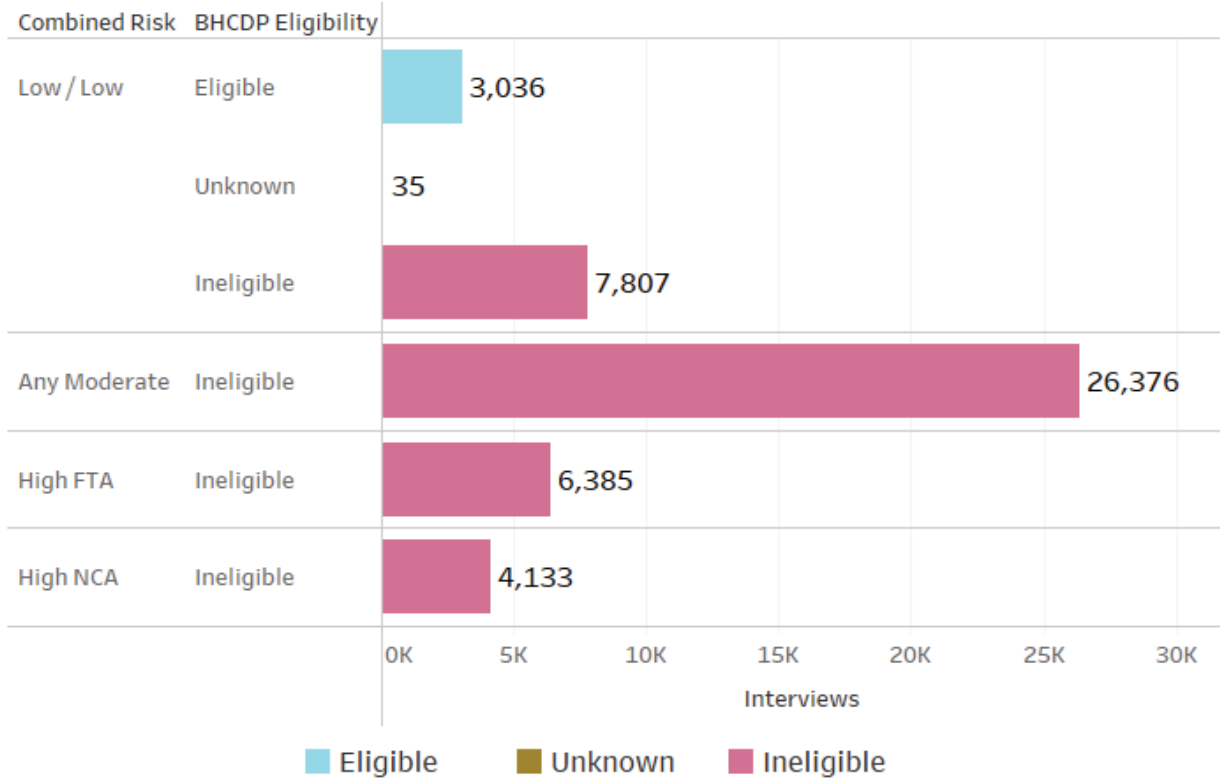
Information in this report is from data collected throughout 2023 and 2024. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) is tasked with the collection and compilation of all the data submitted by the providers and the Commonwealth and County Attorneys, and to submit an annual report each year. In addition to the data reported by the providers and Commonwealth and County Attorneys, this report will also include the number of defendants assessed for eligibility, the specific offenses charged, and the success rates of program participants. This report will also highlight the percentage of defendants who successfully complete the program, those discharged for noncompliance, and the rates of arrest, conviction, and incarceration within six months, one year, and two years after completing the program.

Pretrial Interviews Assessed for BHCDP Eligibility 1/2/2023-12/31/2024

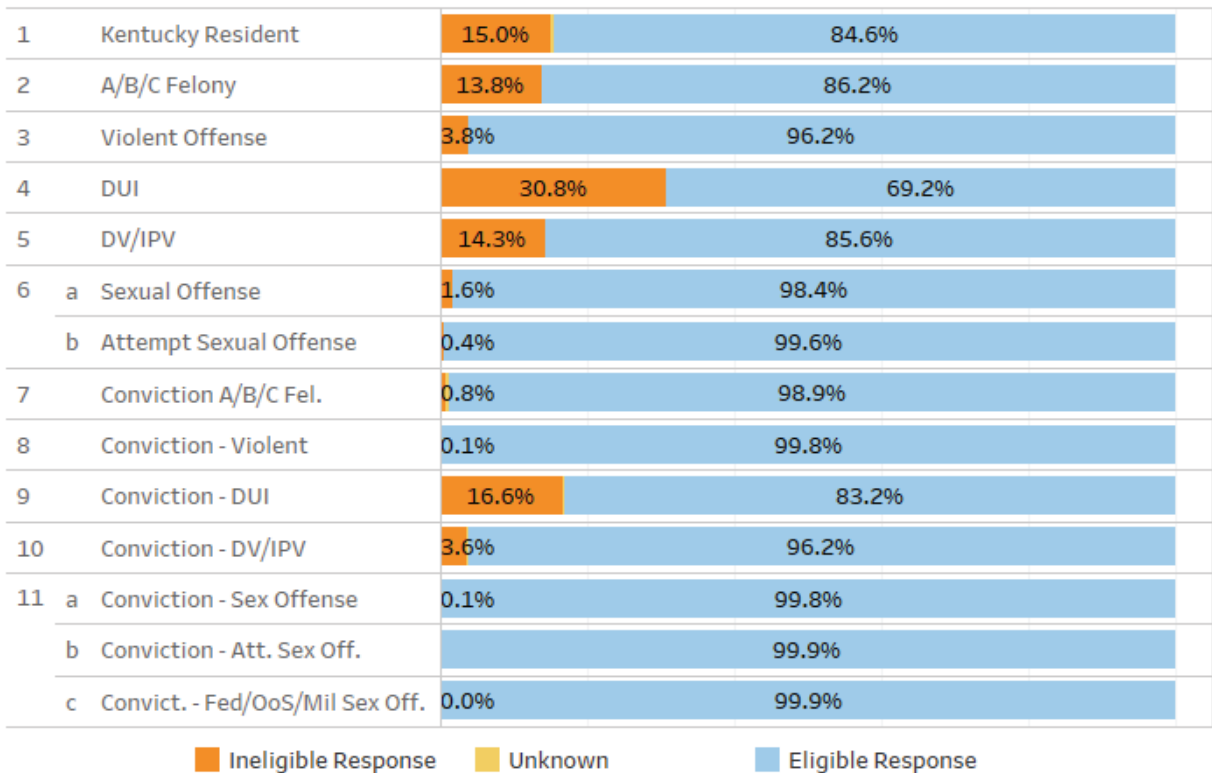

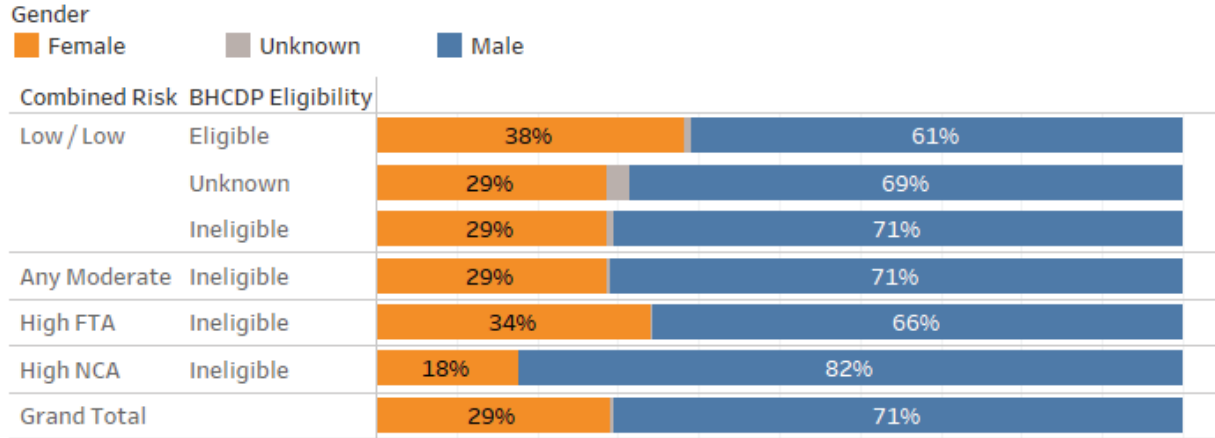
Pretrial Interviews Assessed for BHCDP Eligibility 1/2/2023-12/31/2024

Pretrial Interviews Assessed for BHCDP Eligibility 1/2/2023-12/31/2024

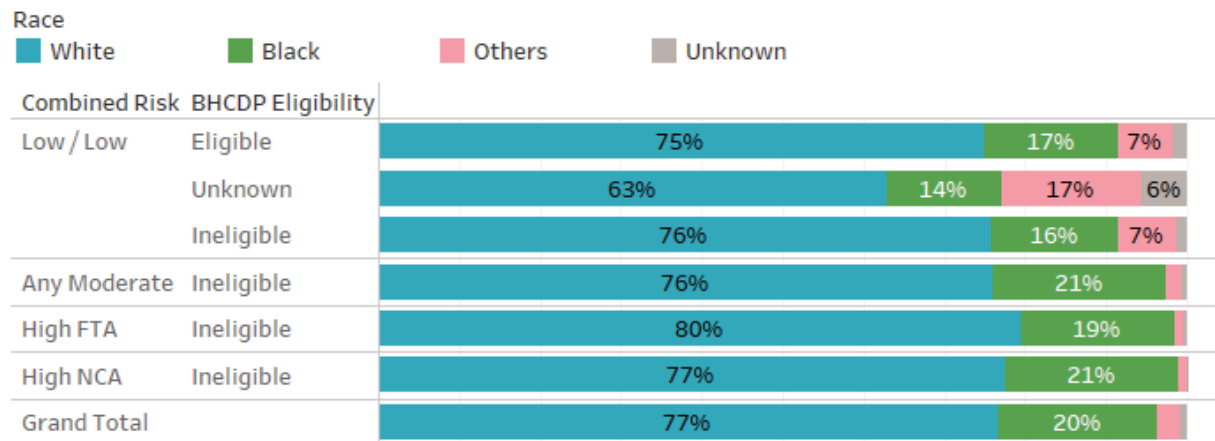
Eligibility Determined by Gender

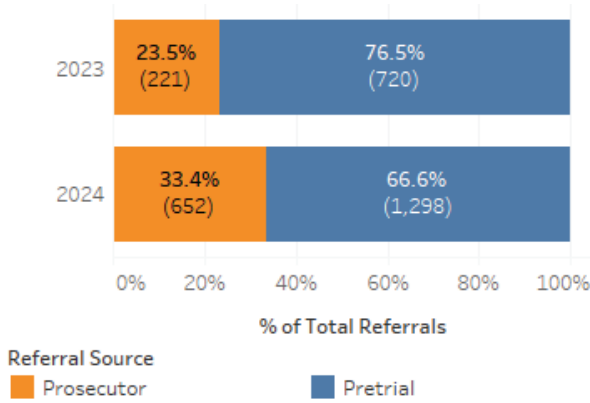
Pretrial Interviews Assessed for BHCDP Eligibility 1/2/2023-12/31/2024

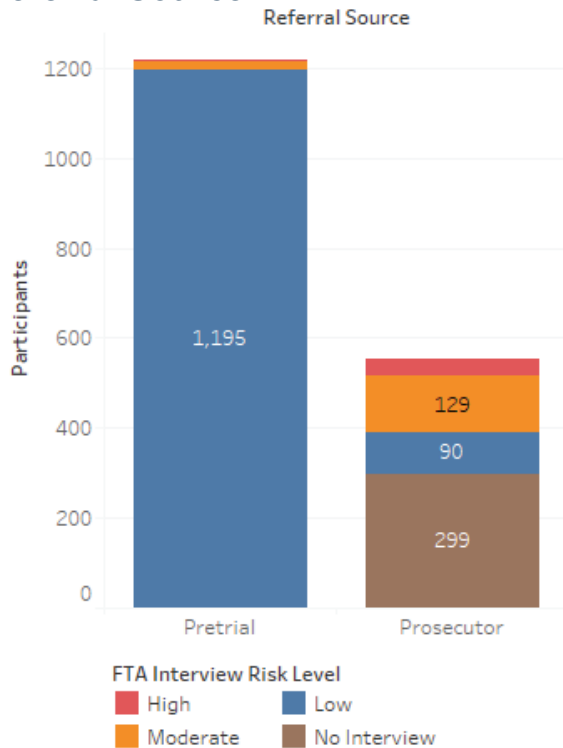

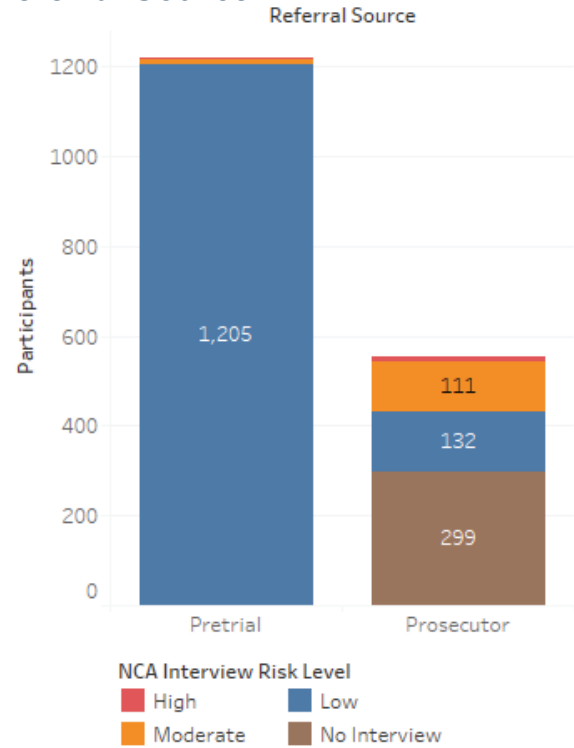

Failure to Appear Risk Level of Participants Referred During CY 2024 by Referral Source



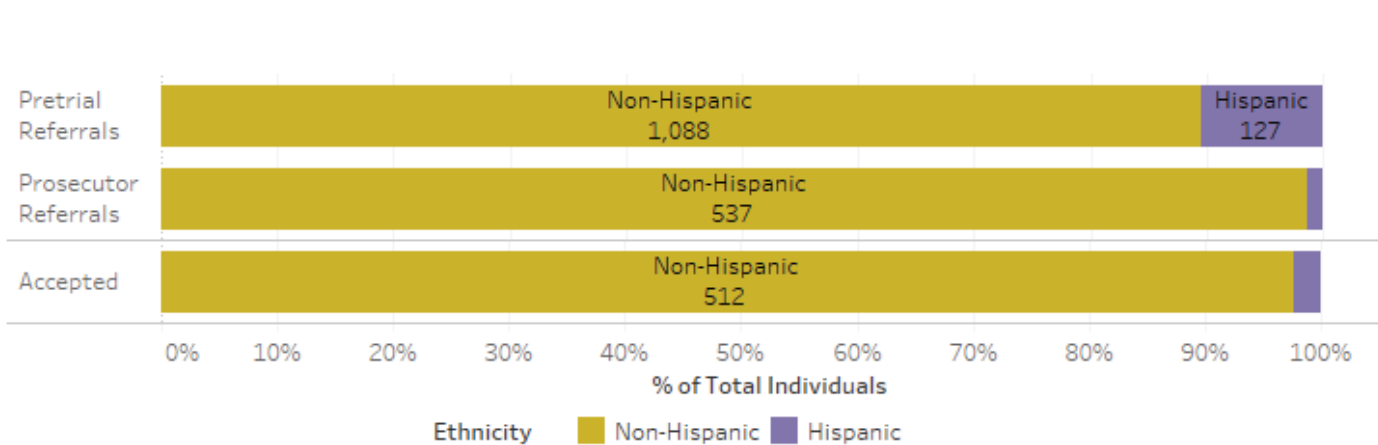
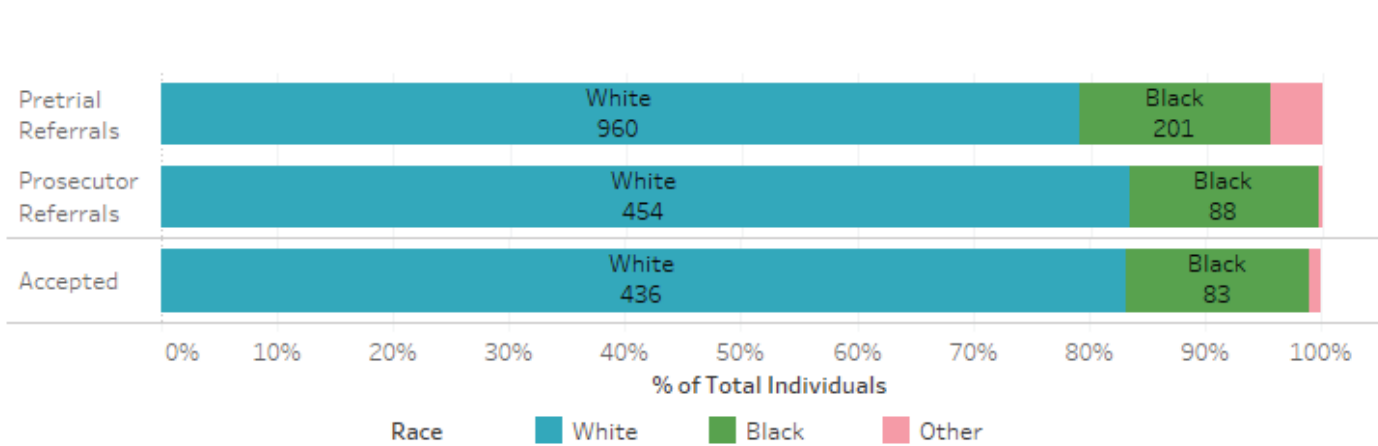
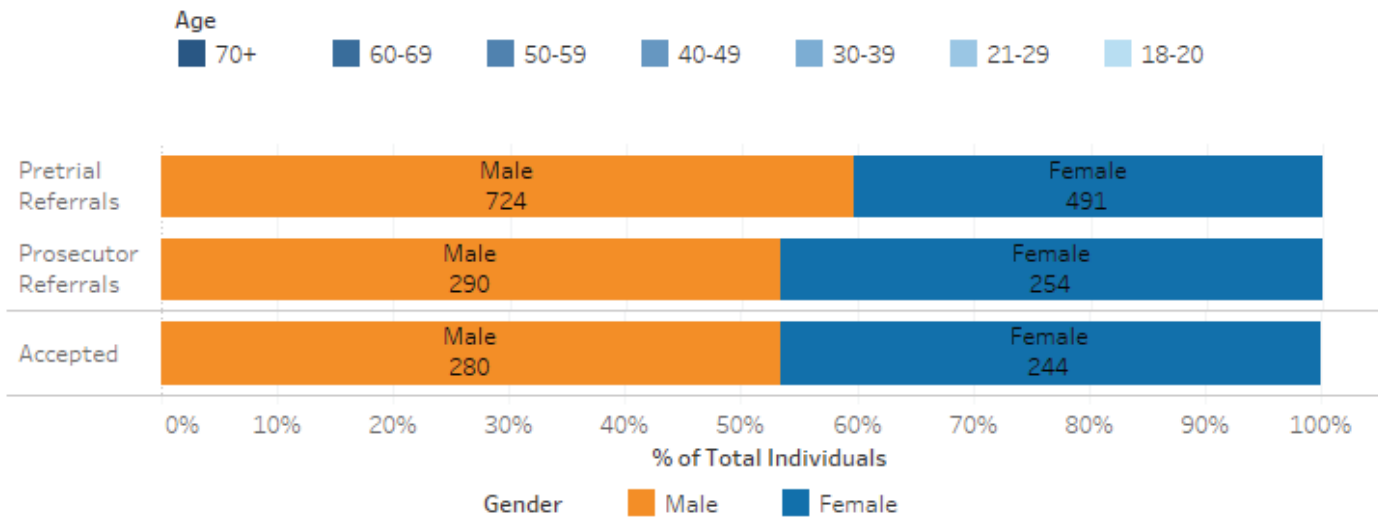
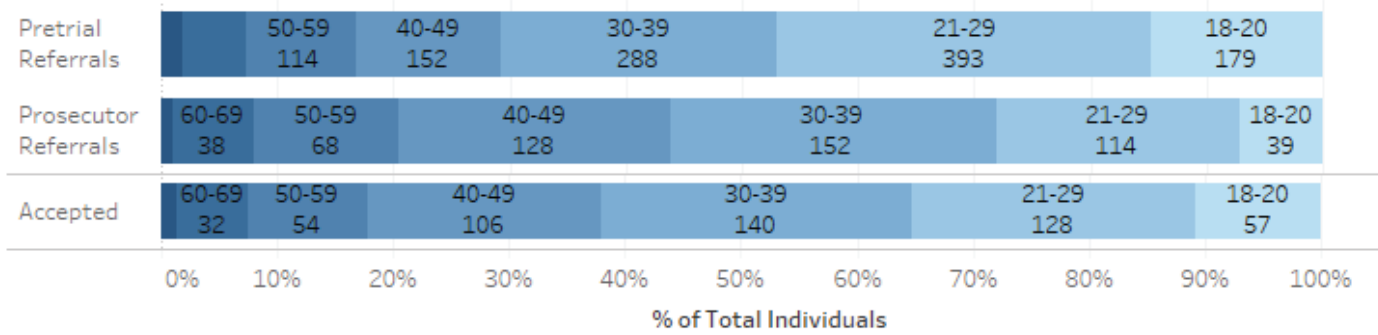

New Criminal Activity Risk Level of Participants Referred During CY 2024 by Referral Source



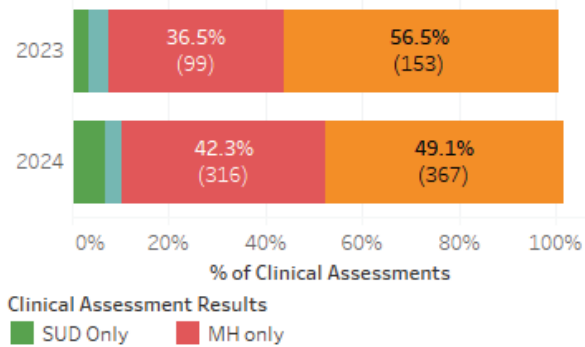

Qualified Assessors from participating BHCDP Pilot Counties submit Clinical Assessment Results to Pretrial Services in accordance with reporting requirements outlined in KRS 533.276. The contents of these reports were compiled into a spreadsheet for purposes of fulfilling the Administrative Office of the Courts' reporting requirements outlined in KRS 533.272(6). The assessor will commonly list only the treatment recommendation for the most dominant disorder if an individual is determined to have co-occurring disorders, and thus, many assessments will only have one treatment recommendation listed rather than two.

BHCDP is required to be established in no less than 10 counties. Counties must have access to MAT, Recovery Services, and sufficient educational/vocational resources. Program is currently operating in Letcher, Madison, Clark, Pulaski, Hopkins, Christian, Oldham, McCracken, Daviess, Greenup, Kenton, Henry, Lewis, Wayne, Warren, Johnson, and Russell counties.

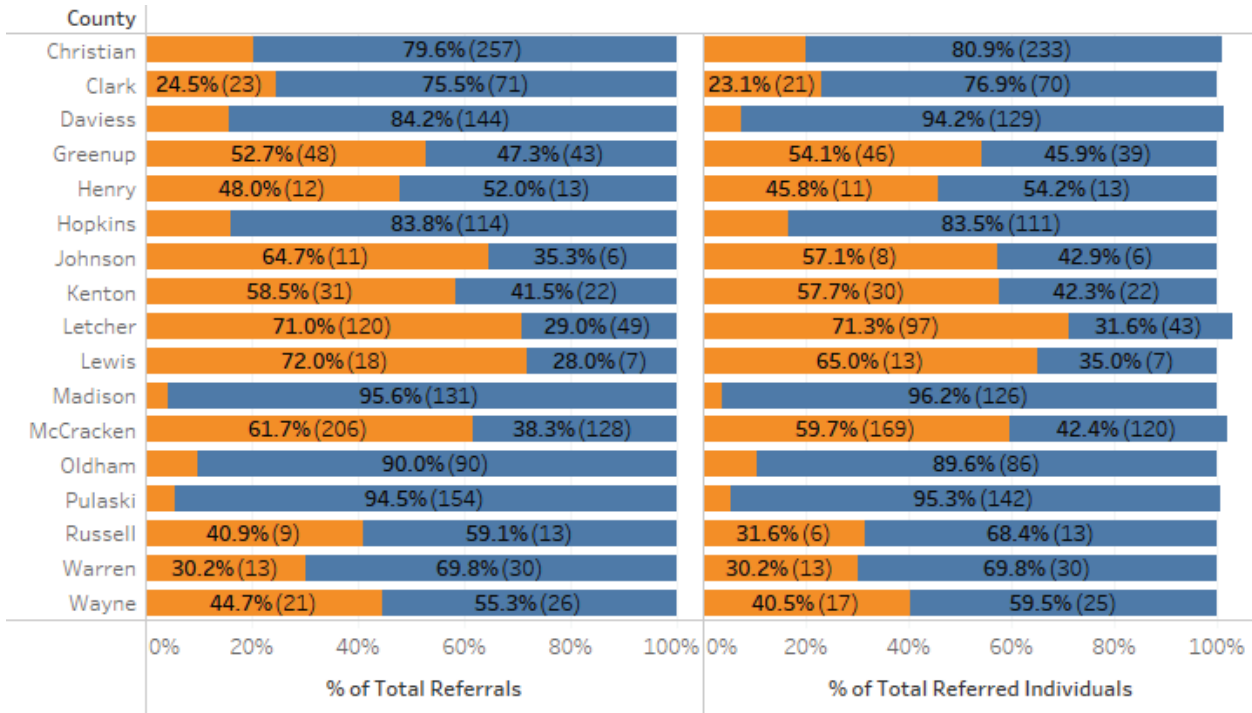

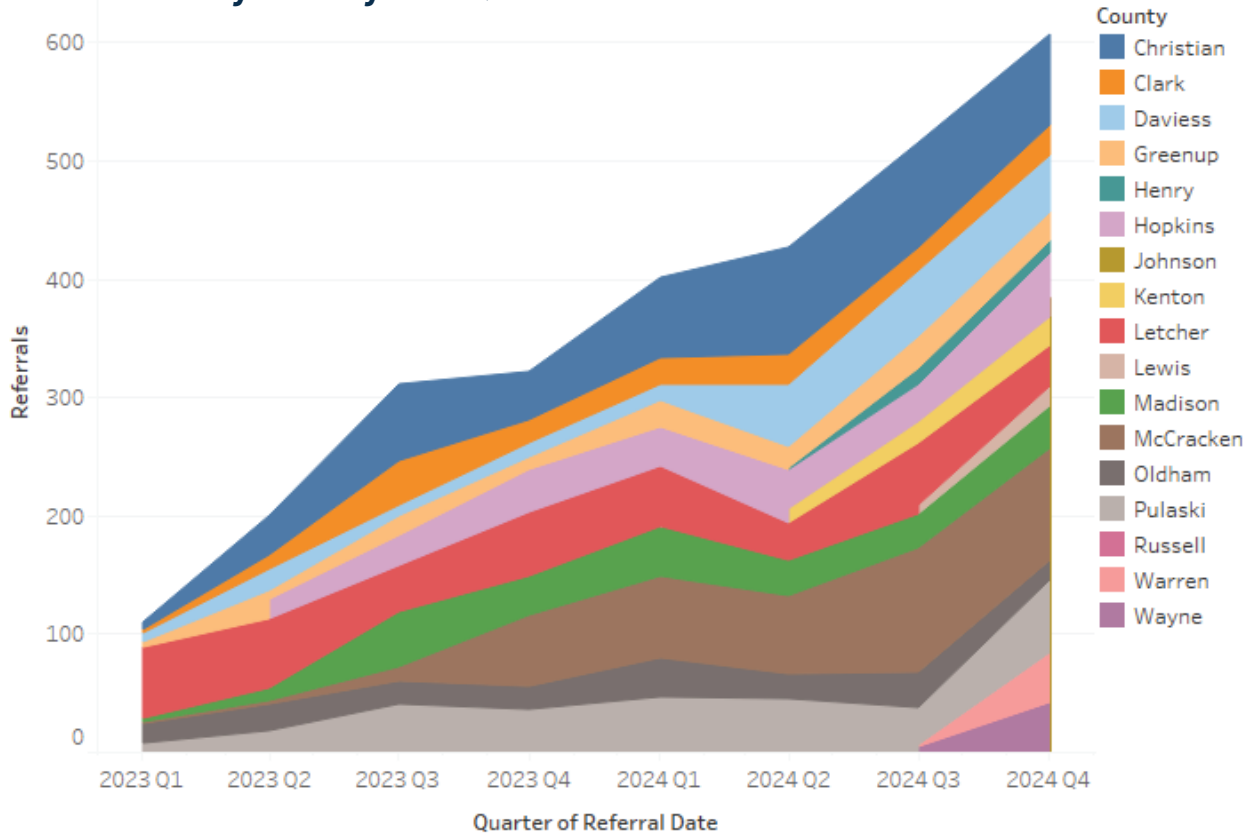

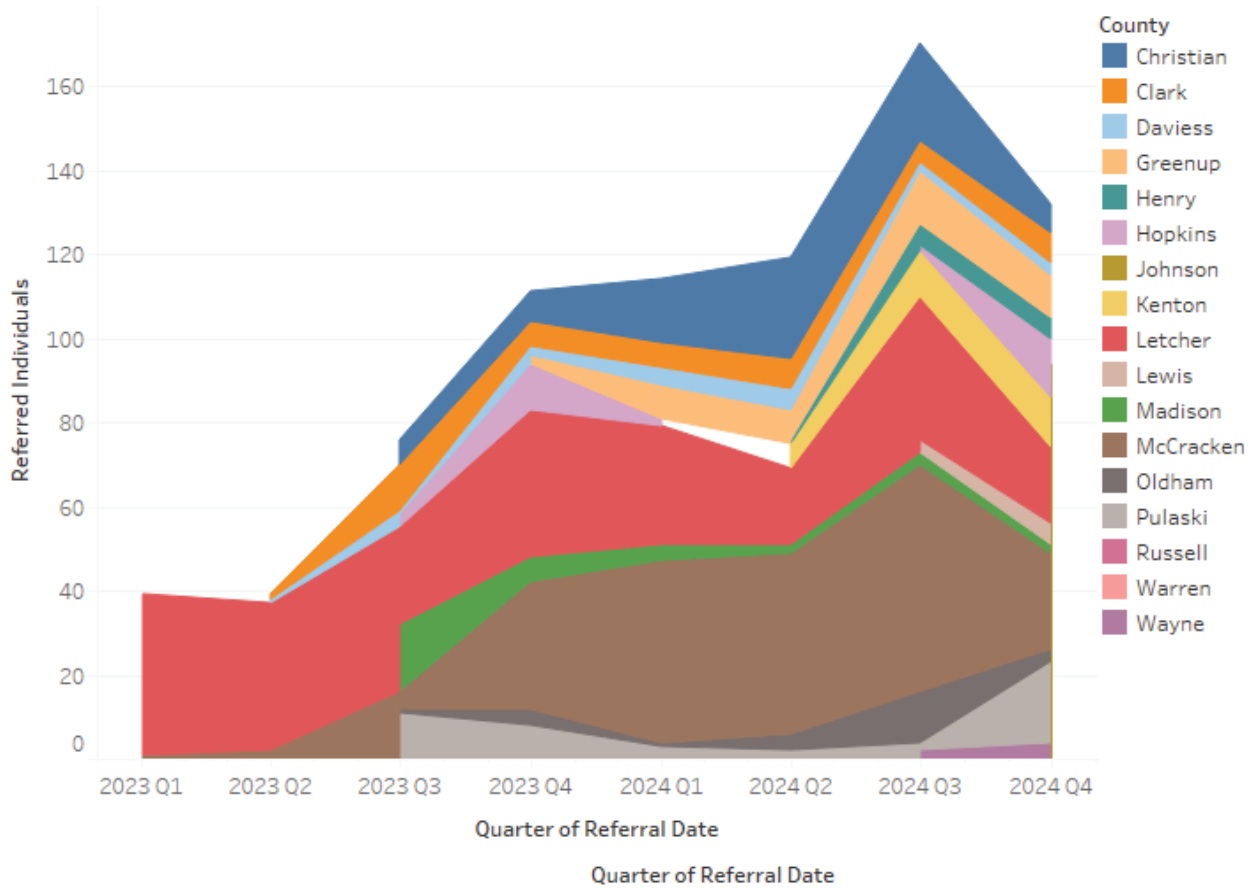
BHCDP Referrals by County and Quarter of Referral Date

BHCDP Participants by County and Quarter of Referral Date

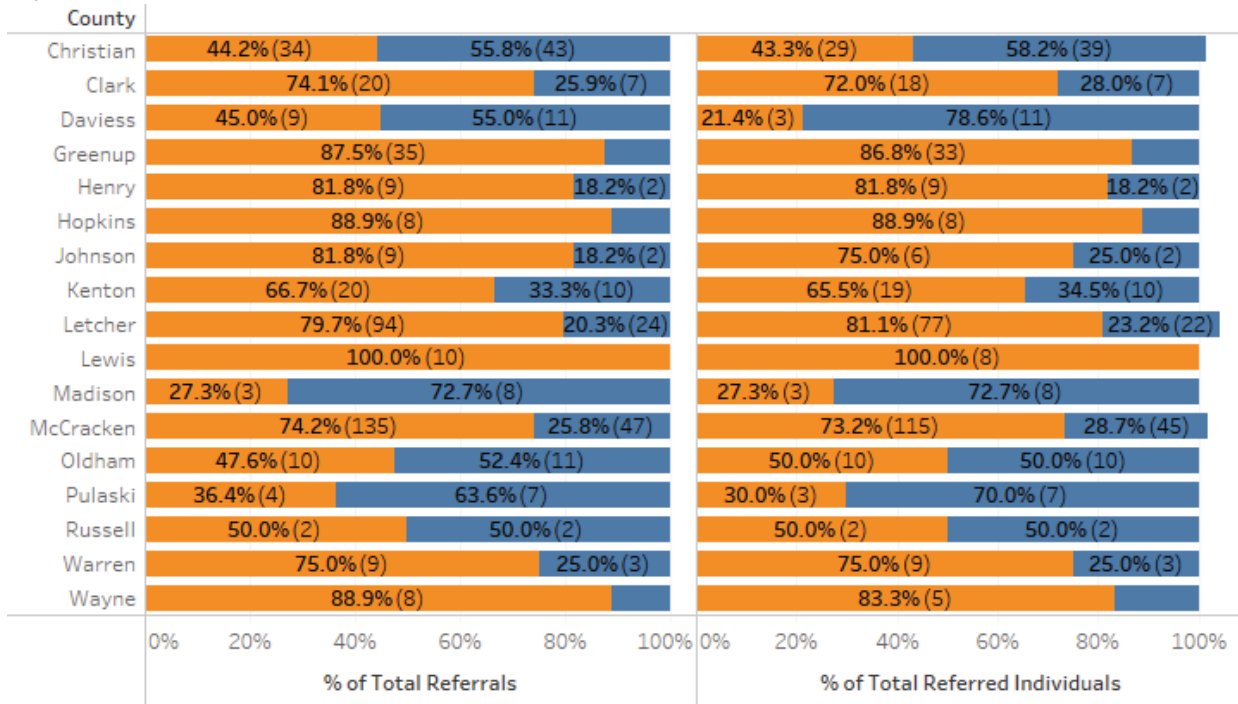

By County and Referral Source CY 2024

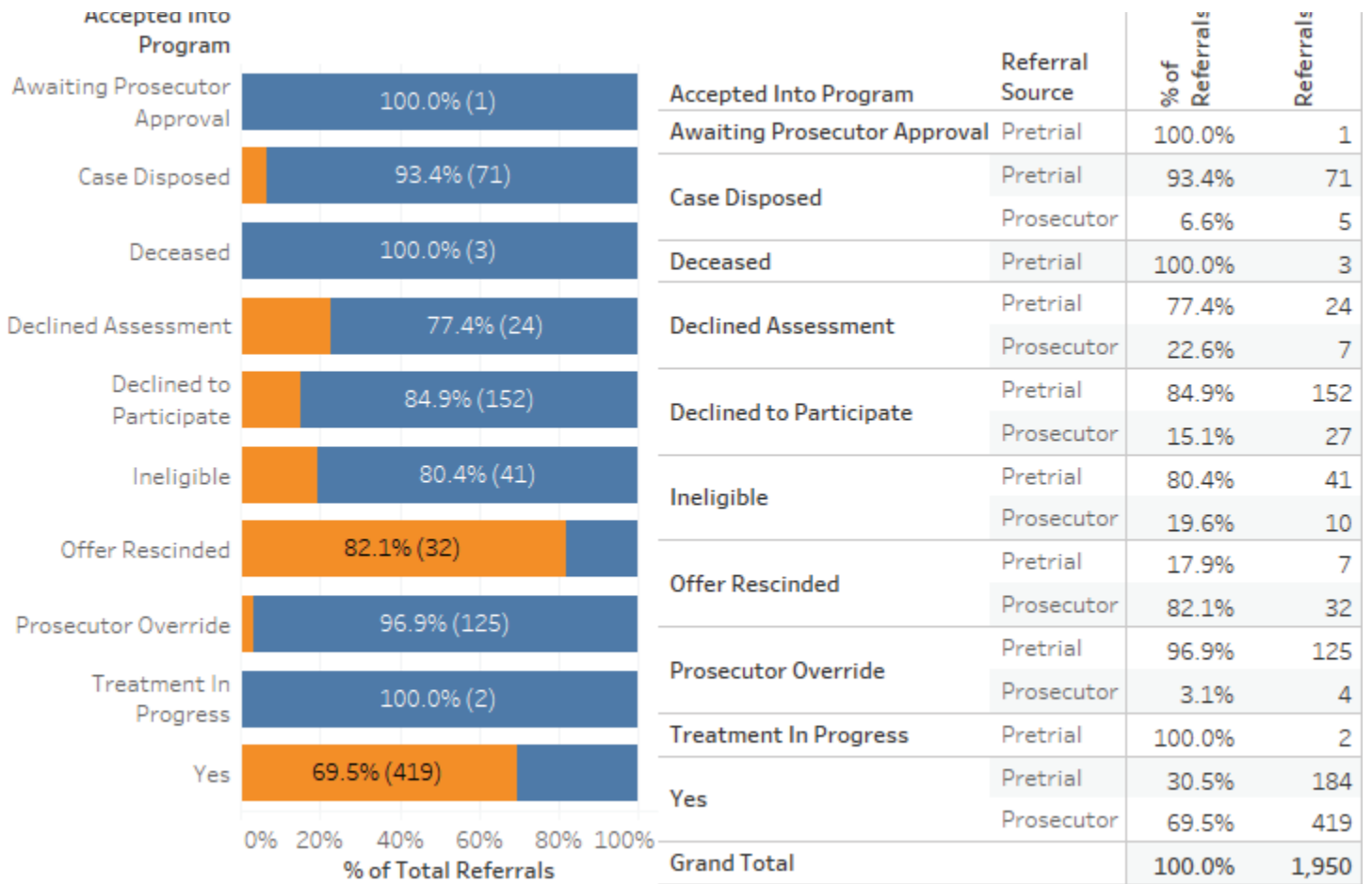

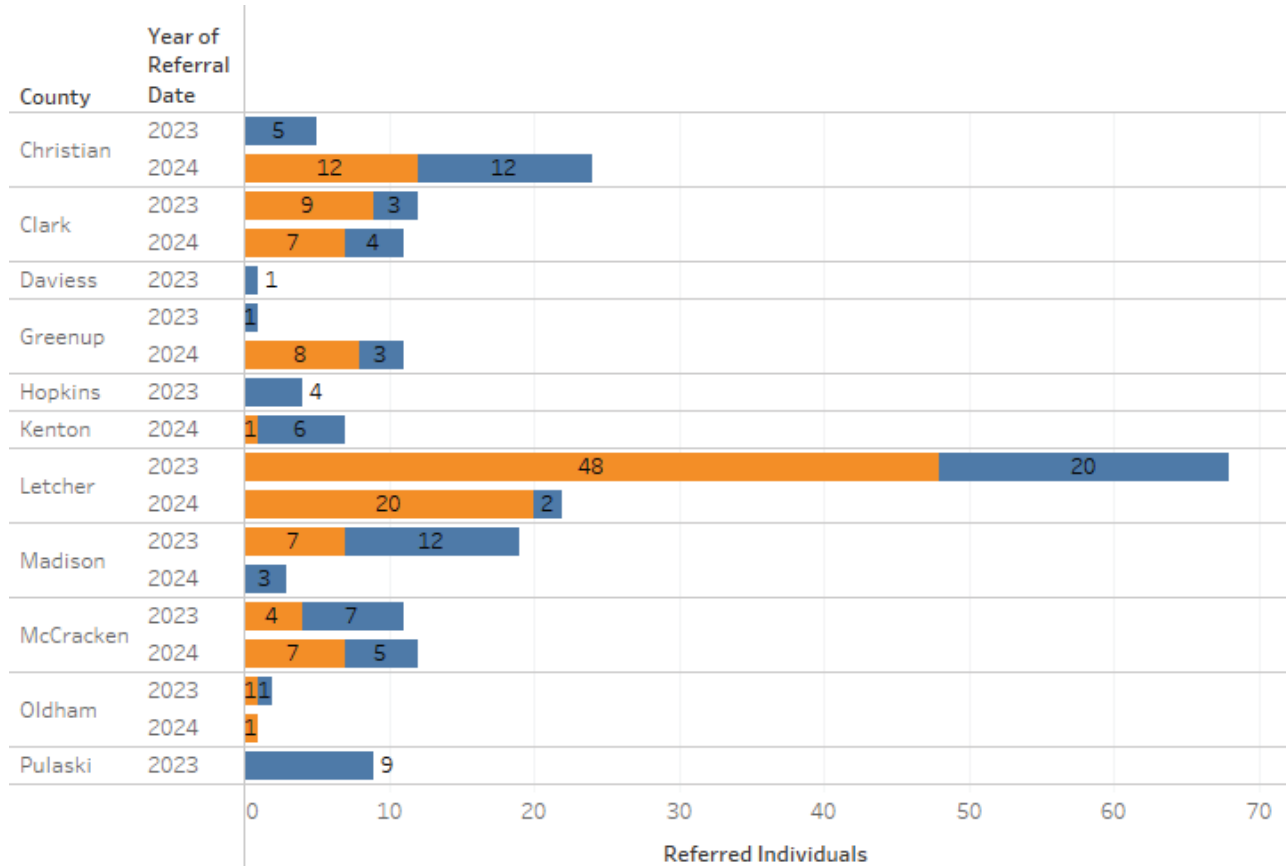

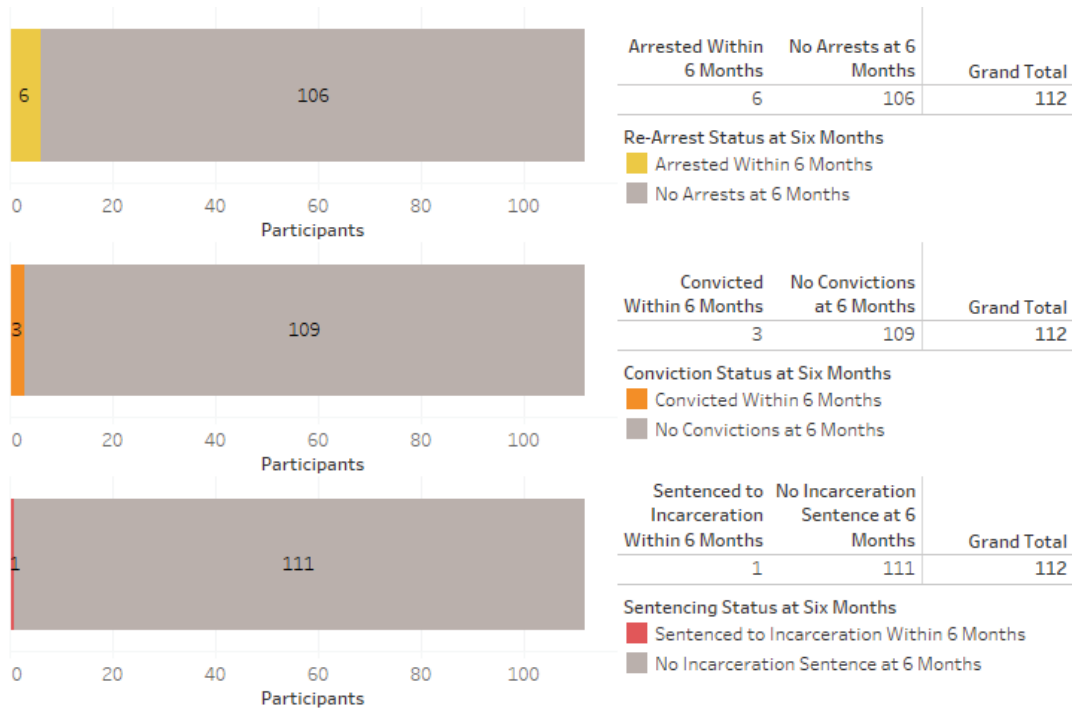

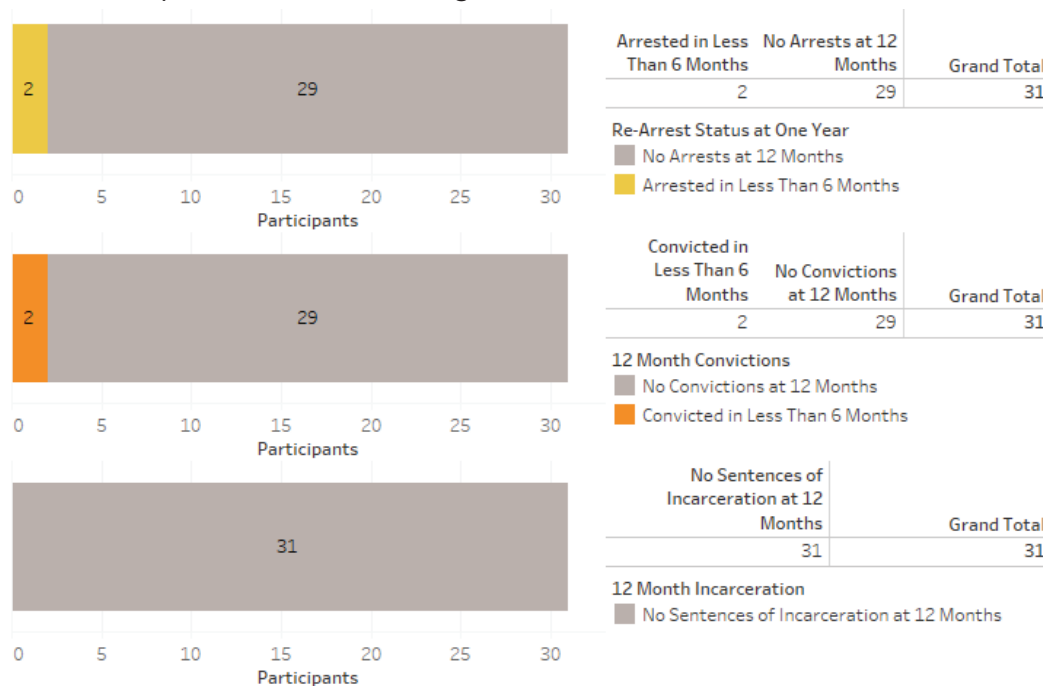

Subsequent Arrest, Conviction, and Sentence of Incarceration Status of Participants Twelve Months after Successful Completion

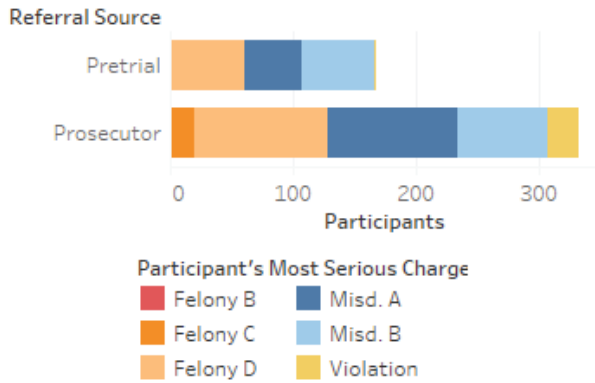

Participants Accepted into BHCDP by Referral Source and Most Serious Charge Referred

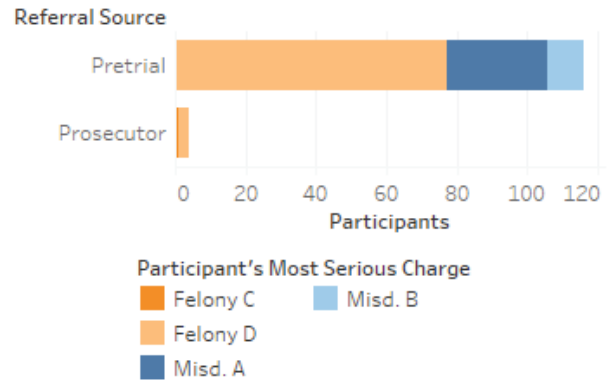
Among Participants Referred During CY 2024

Potential Participants Denied Entry with a Prosecutor Override by Referral Source and Most Serious Offense

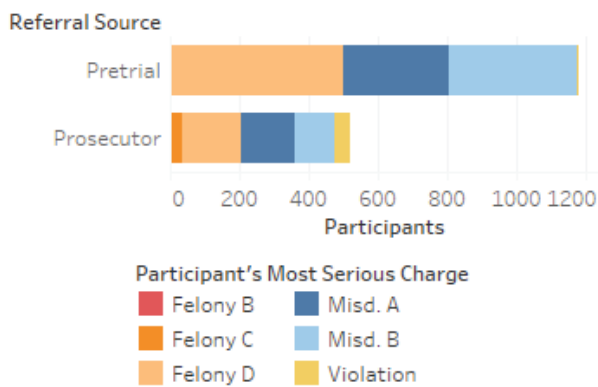
Among Participants Referred During CY 2024

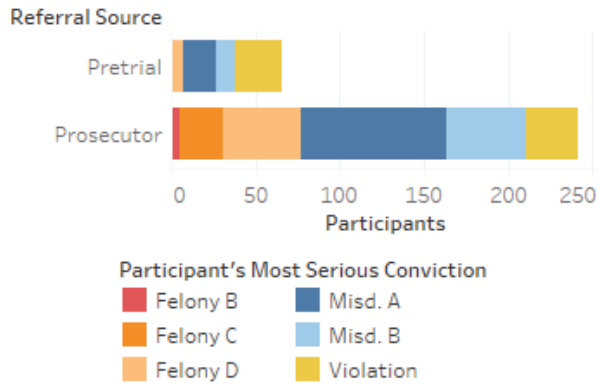
Participants Referred to BHCDP by Referral Source and Most Serious Charge Referred

Participants Accepted into BHCDP by Referral Source and Most Serious Prior Conviction

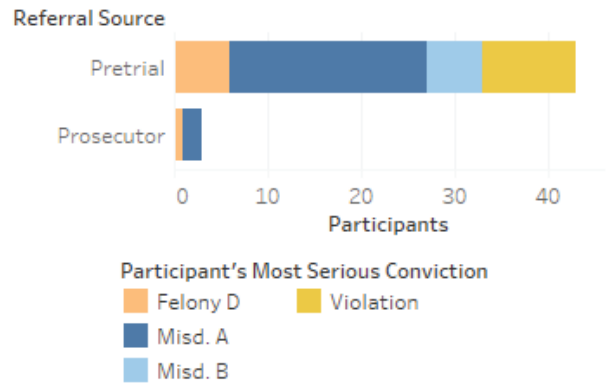

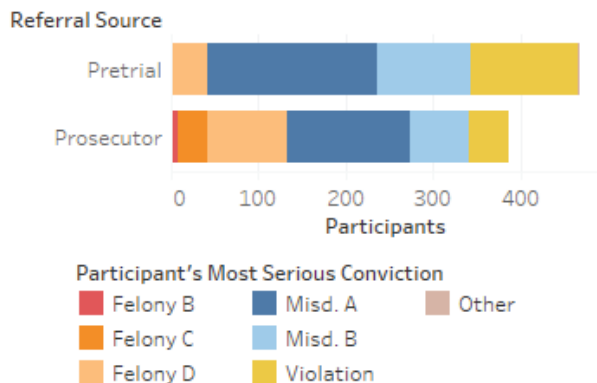

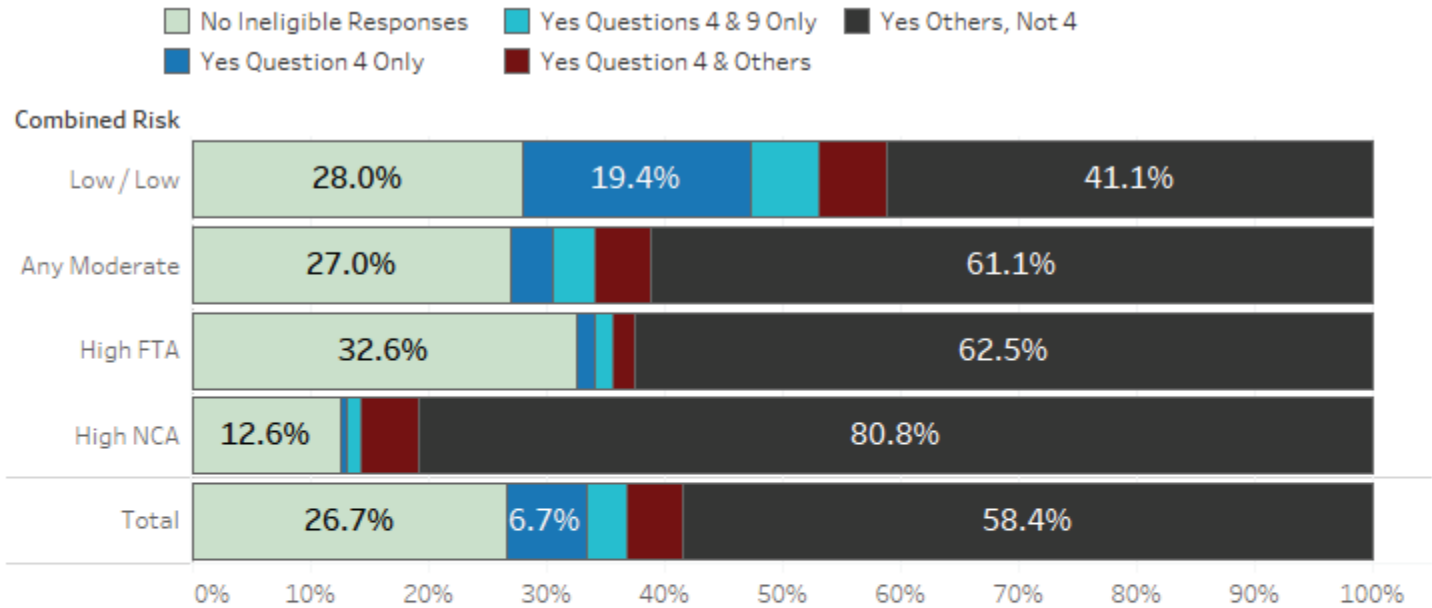

Treatment Provider 14- and 42-day Reports

Behavioral health providers in the program are required to collect data on participants to track the program's effectiveness. The data collection requirements for these providers are as follows:

1. 14-day report: provider must make a report on each participant within 14 days of initiation of treatment including information regarding participant's age, gender, race or ethnicity, housing, educational, and employment history, any past involvement in substance use or mental health disorder treatment, and criminal history.
2. 42-day report-provides the participant's progress in the program, including whether the participant is still enrolled in the program, treatment information, job or education status, housing, and any additional details that may assist in evaluation of the program. If a participant is no longer enrolled in the program, then the provider shall note the specific reason for discharge.
3. Quarterly reports- required on a quarterly basis and shall include the data required in the 14-day and 42-day report, as well as the number of total participants who are: compliant; discharged; participating in medication-assisted treatment; job skills or training; or educational component of the program.
4. Final report-completed within 30 days of discharge of program. If participant is discharged for non-compliance, then report shall detail reason for discharge, length of time in program, goals met, barriers to completion and any recommended adjustments to the program. If the participant completed the program successfully, the report will summarize their progress, any further treatment needed, and recommendations for improving the program for others.

Behavior health providers' participant information is gathered through FGI's data platform, DDOR. All approved providers and case navigators are given training and technical support on DDOR. FGI supplies the Administrative Office of the Courts with treatment provider data quarterly or upon request.

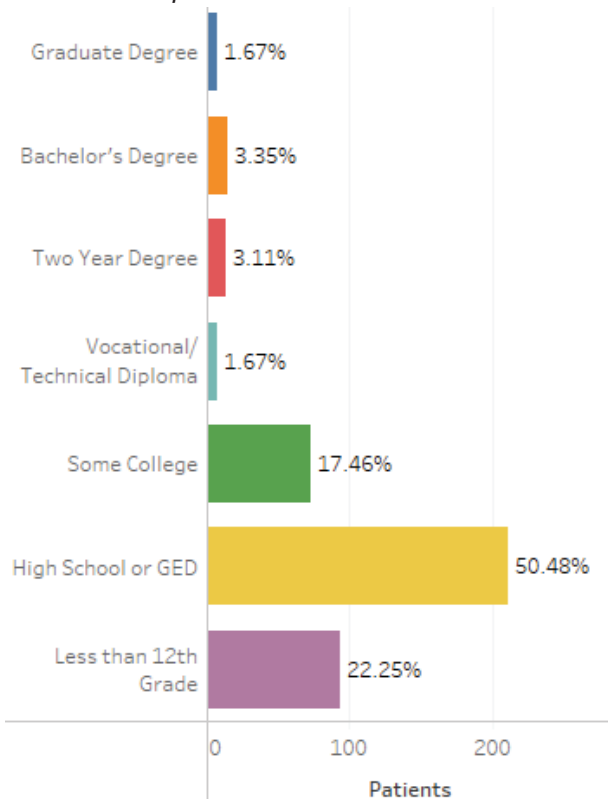

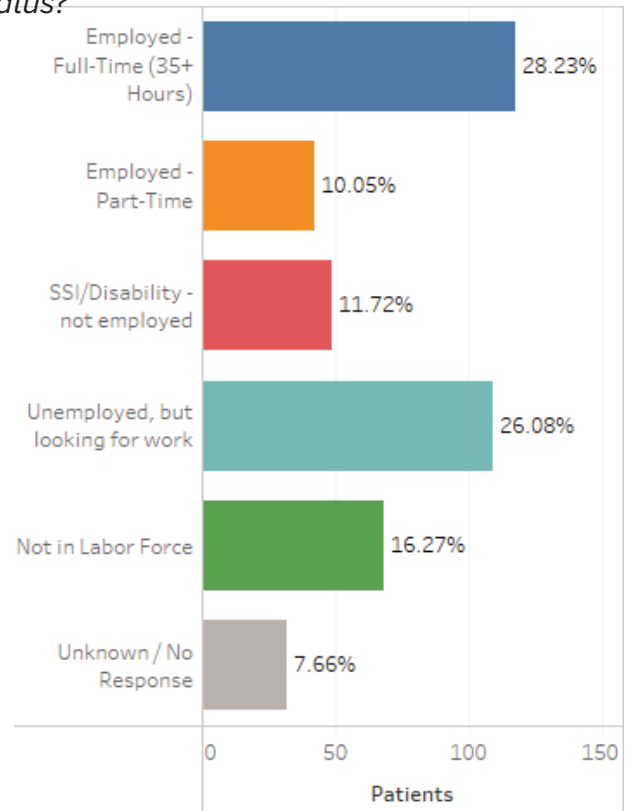
Responses to Questions from 14-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

What is the Participant's Highest Level of Education Completed?



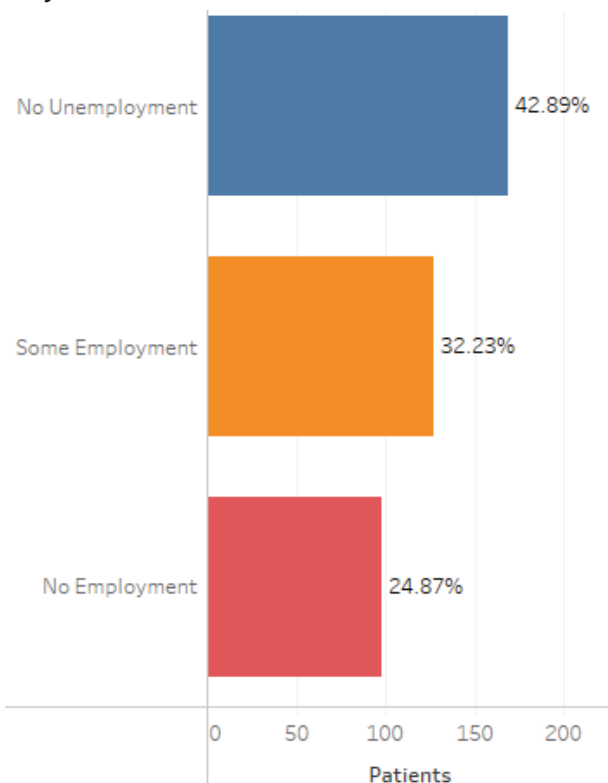
Responses to Questions from 14-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

What is the Participant's Current Employment Status?



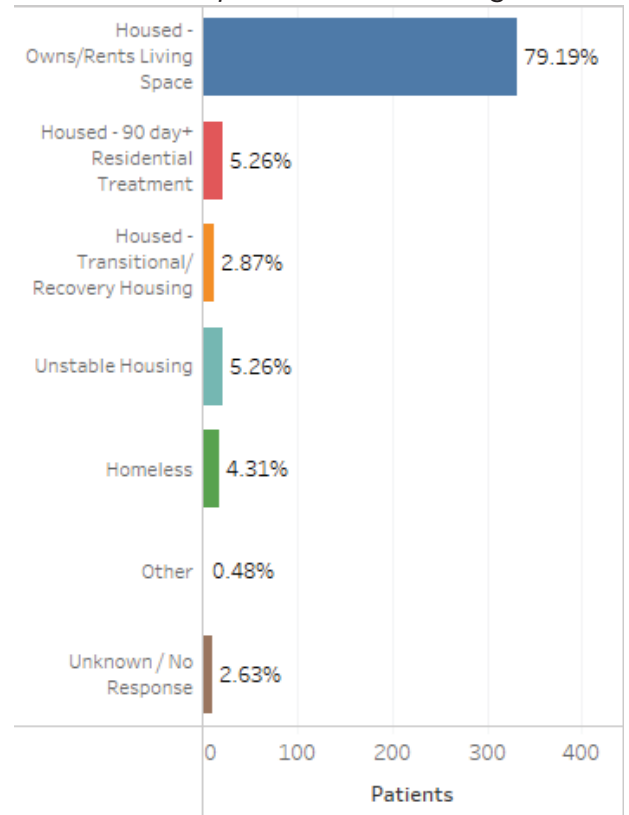
Responses to Questions from 14-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

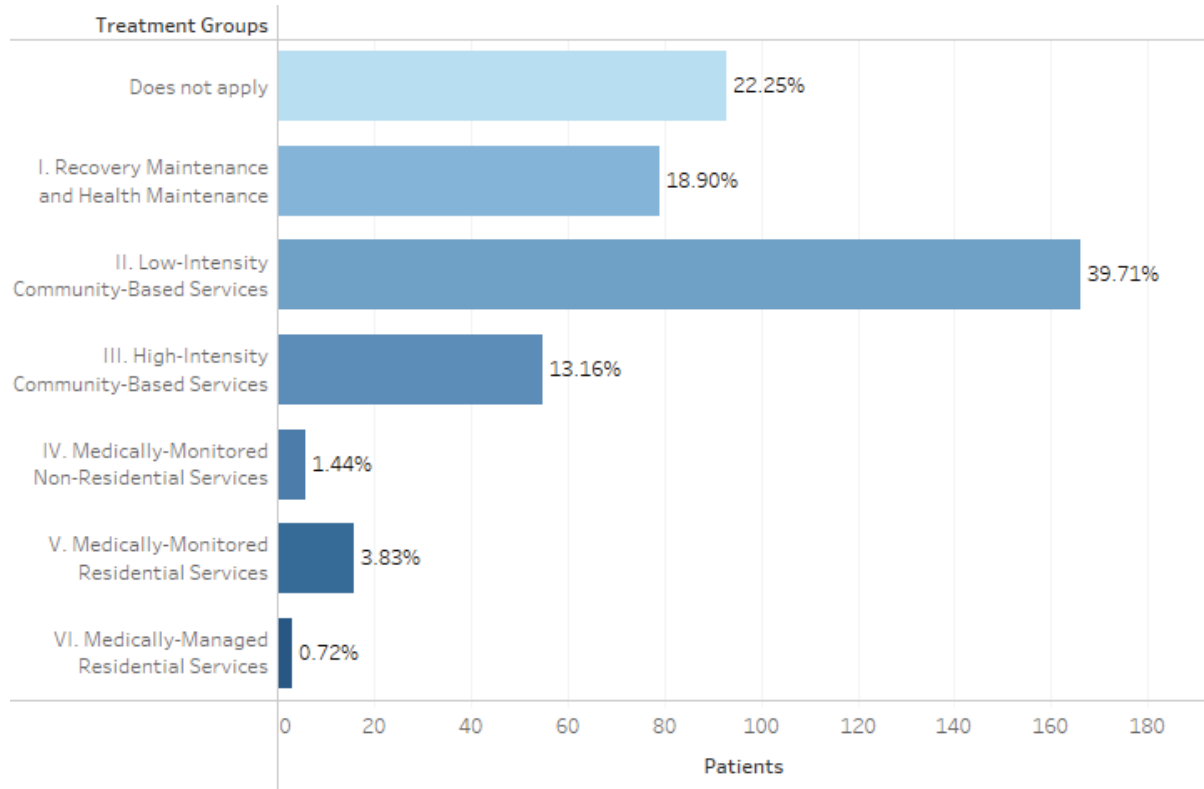
Responses to Questions from 14-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

What is the Participant's Current Living Situation?



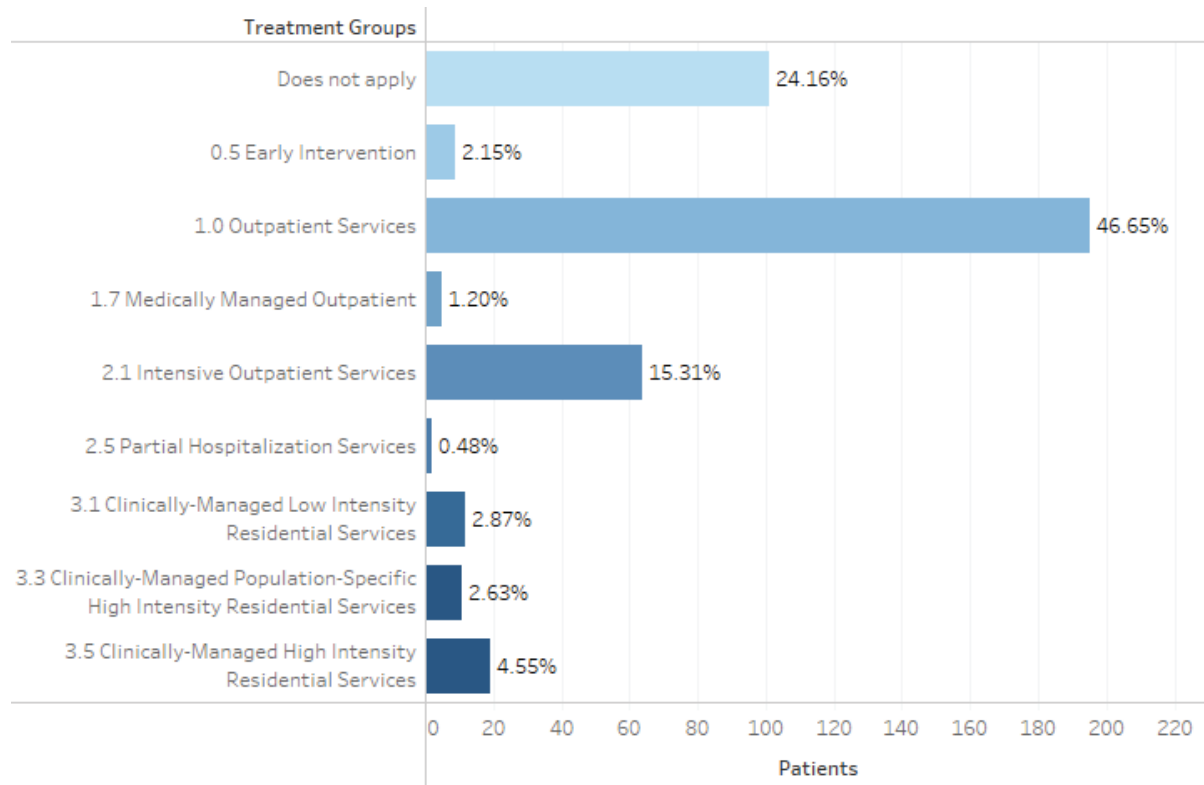
Responses to Questions from 14-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

What is the Participant's Current Level of Care for Mental Health Disorder?



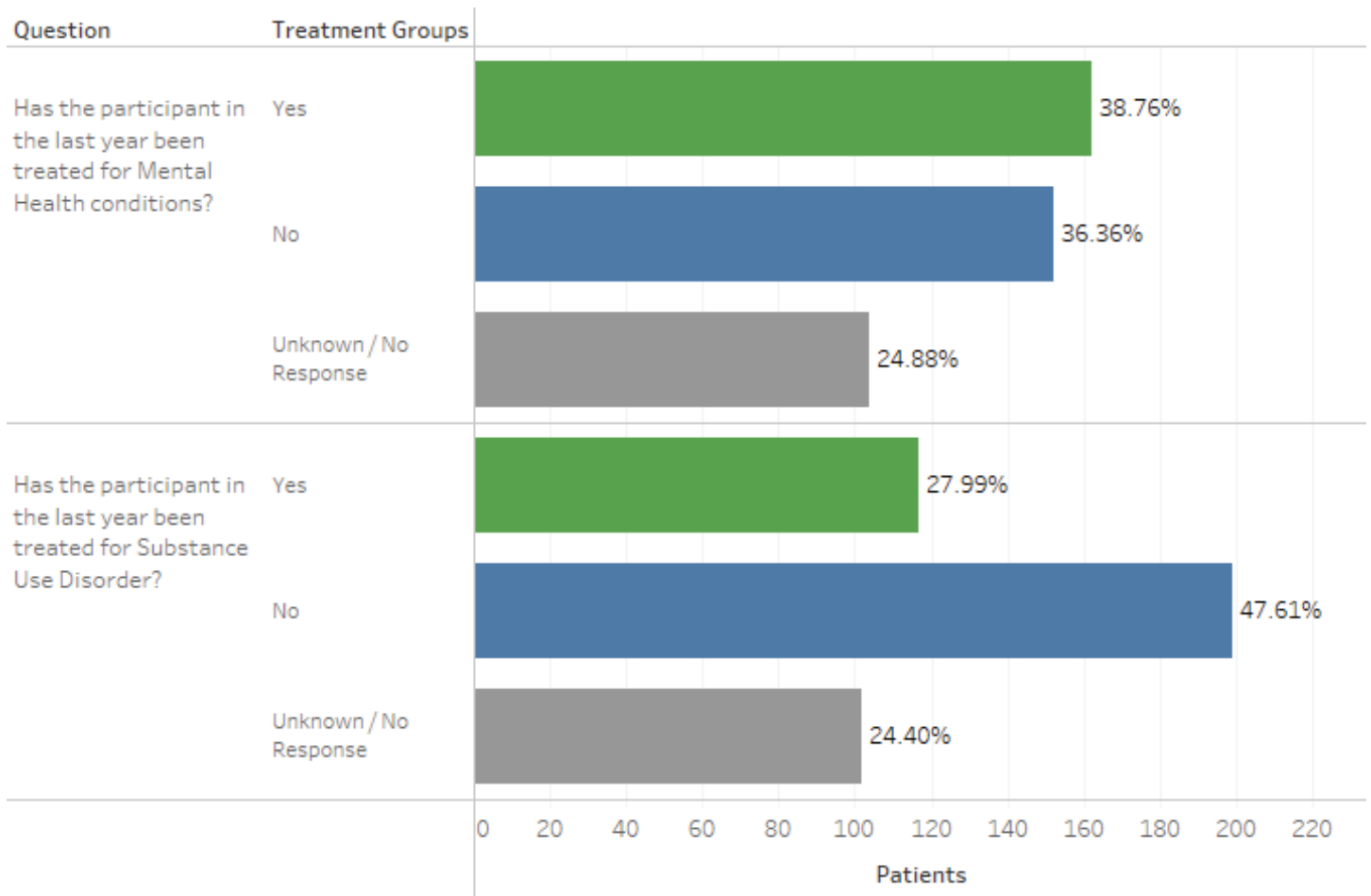
Responses to Questions from 14-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

Has the Participant in the Last Year Been Treated for Mental Health Conditions or Substance Use Disorder?

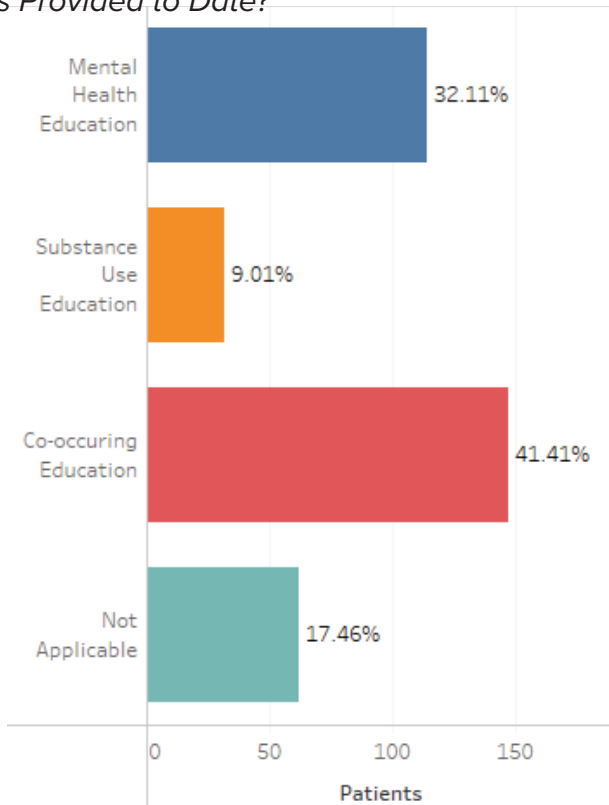

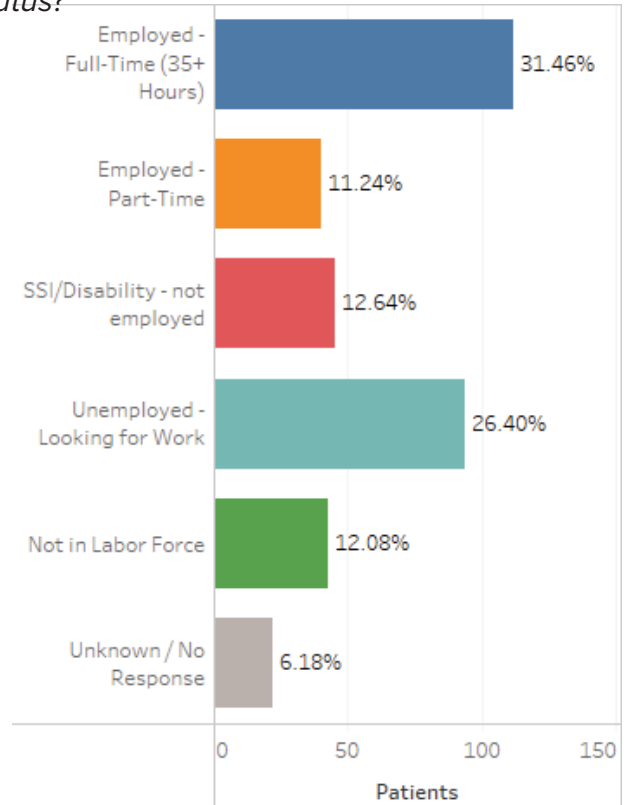
Responses to Questions from 42-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

What are the Educational Services Your Agency has Provided to Date?



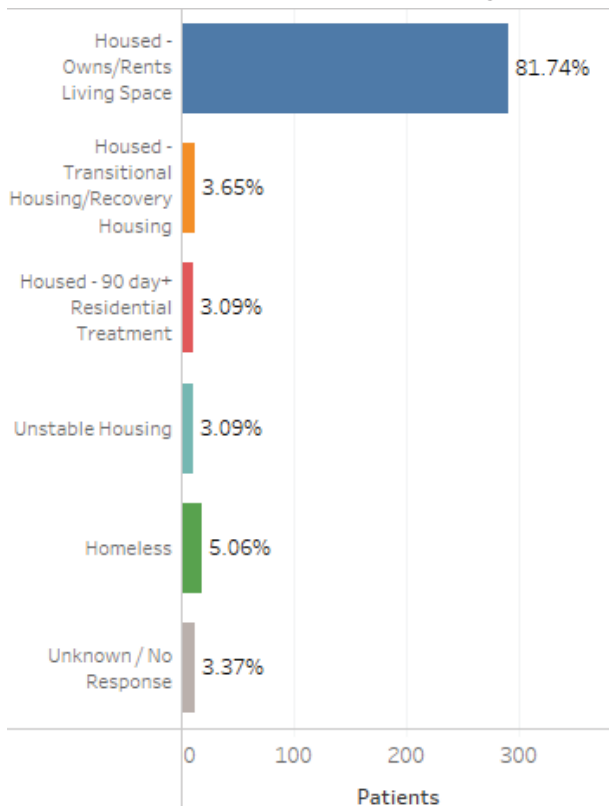
Responses to Questions from 42-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

What is the Participant's Current Living Situation?

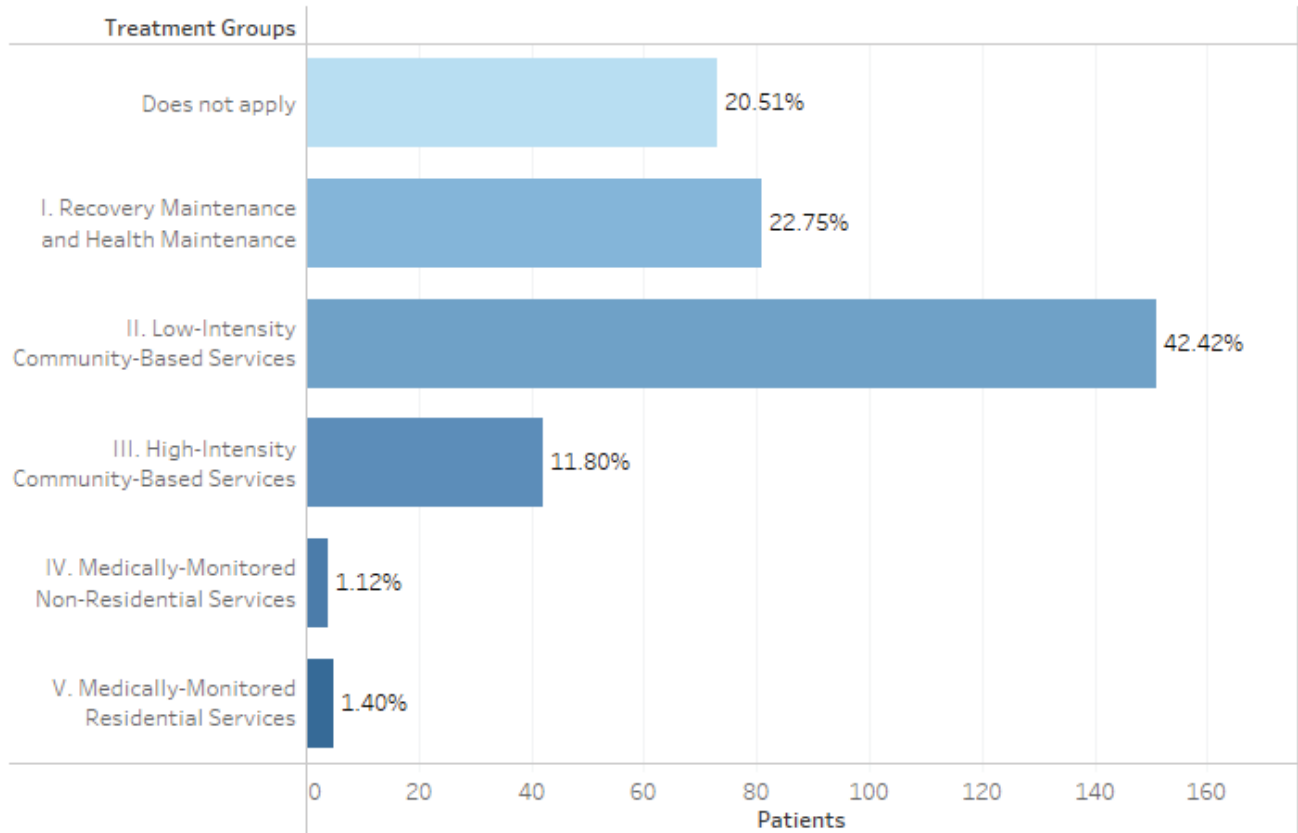

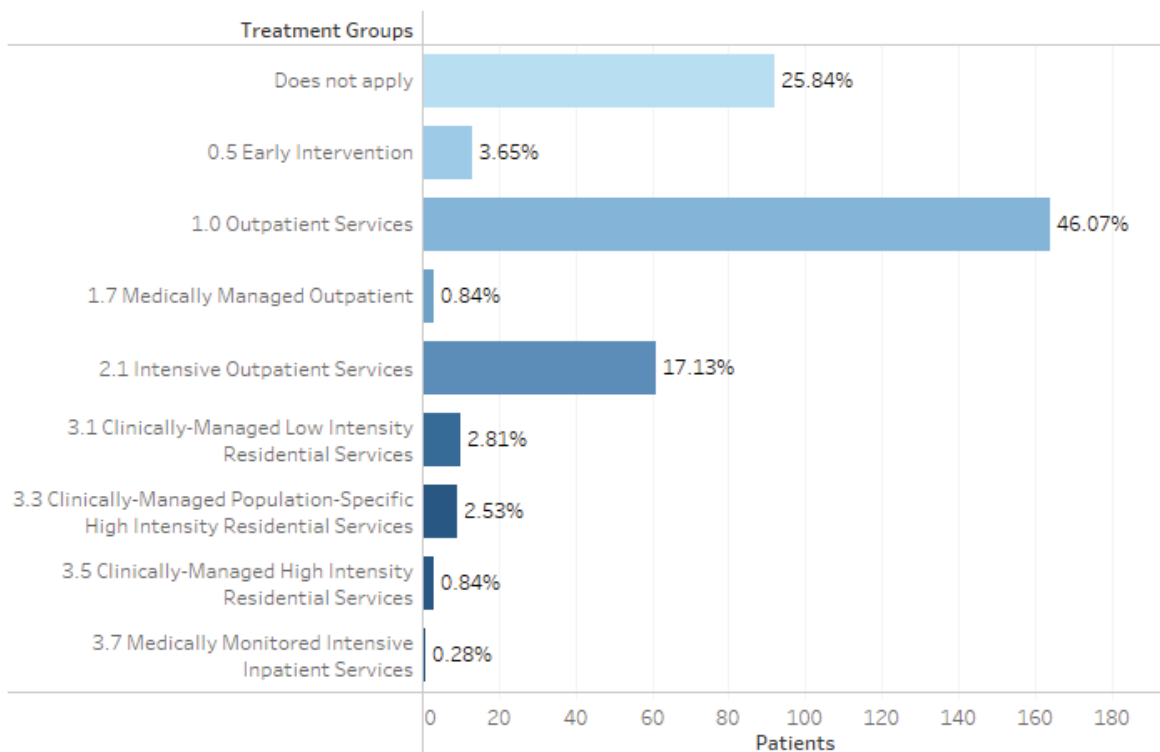
Responses to Questions from 42-Day Status Reports Entered During CY 2024

The contents of these reports were compiled into tables for purposes of fulfilling the Administrative Office of the Courts' reporting requirements outlined in KRS 533.272(6). These seven pages detail the contents of those reports grouped by Provider and Reporting Quarter.

At the time of publication, provider data is not yet finalized. Updated information will be available as it is updated by partner organizations. Additionally, the University of Kentucky Center on Alcohol Research is conducting a study and will guide all partners on quality improvement practices regarding collection and reporting of data.

Final Reports

In the first year of SB 90 there were 25 participants who've successfully completed BHCDP from four counties. In 2024 that number has increased significantly to over 760 participants from all of the original pilot counties. The average length of agreement for the successful participants is six months working on their goals and through a variety of barriers (see below for most reported goals and barriers).

There have been 105 participants who've been released from BHCDP, 16 withdrew from the program voluntarily, 85 were discharged due to non-compliance with treatment or prosecutor, and 4 were deceased. The average length of time these participants were in BHCDP before being released was 90 days.

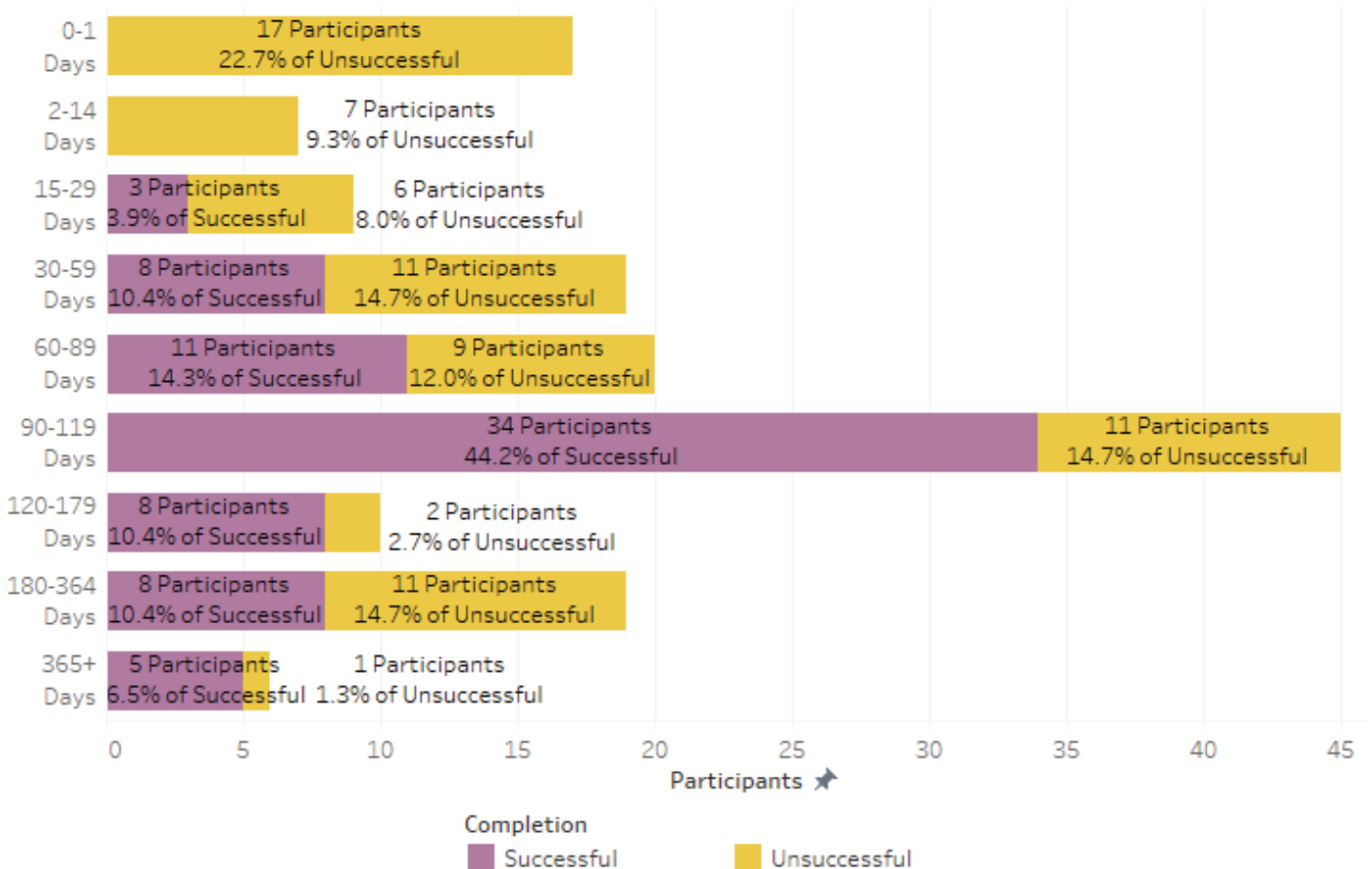

This table shows that in 2024 SB 90's presence almost doubled in active counties and almost quadrupled its amount of participants. Currently, SB 90's successful completions rate is at 67.29% while it's in discharge due to non-compliance rates are at 26.5%.

Kentucky Adult Education

The Office of Adult Education screens participants to assess their education, work history, military experience (if applicable), strengths and limitations, and skills. Based on this, a tailored educational and job training plan may be developed if the participant chooses to pursue these opportunities. The plan includes educational goals, job training specifics, sector-focused skills, hours of study, support services, progress tracking, and job placement assistance. The office also helps participants access scholarships or grants for educational or training costs.

Year Two Progress Report

The second year of the Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) marked significant progress and alignment across branches within the Office of Adult Education (OAE) and the larger Kentucky Adult Education community to include Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) partners and external stakeholders. To synchronize all reentry-related operations and to support strategic alignment with state-level partners, oversight of the BHCDP transitioned to the Reentry and Employment Services Branch of the OAE in May 2024. This task reorganization provided the necessary flexibility to enhance integration between the BHCDP and the Putting Kentuckians First (PKF) initiative, creating a holistic approach to supporting Kentuckians impacted by the justice system.

The central theme for The Reentry and Employment Services Branch and OAE during this period has been awareness and engagement. Targeted outreach efforts increased stakeholder understanding of the services provided by resulting in a substantial increase in participants' access to educational and workforce resources. Enhanced awareness not only deepened relationships with stakeholders involved in the BHCDP process but also fostered new partnership opportunities that extend beyond the program in support of sustainable participant success.

To further support participants, OAE activated the BHCDP Training & Vocational Voucher Program, enabling individuals to pursue education and training opportunities. Leveraging BHCDP Trust Fund resources, OAE focused on reducing barriers to

educational and vocational success while meeting the program’s administrative and operational needs. Efforts to expand available vendors for both educational services and workforce barrier relief were largely driven by participant feedback, demonstrating OAE’s commitment to responsive and impactful program delivery.

These initiatives underscore OAE’s dedication to empowering justice-involved individuals through innovative solutions, fostering partnerships, and expanding access to resources, ultimately contributing to the broader success of the BHCDP, its participants and the Commonwealth.

In 2024, KYAE received 438 referrals from treatment providers on behalf of the BHCDP. Of those 438 referrals, 59% (259) received services from the KYAE local provider network in support of the BHCDP statutory requirements per KRS 533.286. Of those 259 participants who received services, 15% (41) have or are currently participating in other KYAE services, which include GED attainment, career or technical-related services, and workforce preparation services. This has resulted in 30 positive employment outcomes. KYAE is postured to provide services to the remaining referrals when the participants are ready and able to move into the education, training, and employment phase.

OAE received a total of 39 requests for assistance through the BHCDP Trust to support workforce, education, and training initiatives. These requests included:

Education and Training: 21 requests to assist individuals seeking additional education or training.

- 10 requests for post-secondary education
- 1 request for certification/tuition assistance for barber college
- 2 requests for CDL training
- 8 pending education requests for the Spring 2025 semester
- 5 requests were denied or incomplete

Supportive Services: 13 requests to aid employment and retention efforts, including assistance for uniforms or work clothing, transportation, and tools or other items necessary for employment.

These requests resulted in \$33,360.12 spent from the BHCDP Trust fund to support the employment, training, and education of participants.

The BHCDP is a vitally important resource in Kentucky’s effort to improve the safety and vitality of communities. When those caught in the webs of substance use and mental health challenges face only incarceration and the criminal courts, the outcome is too often one of high cost and low success. The BHCDP exists to break that cycle and provide real solutions that improve lives and keep communities safe while still holding individuals accountable. DPA is committed to the success of this important program and looks forward to its continuation and expansion.



Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program

Barrier Relief Overview

The Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP) Barrier Relief component was implemented in May 2024 and is overseen by the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP). Headquartered in Hazard, Kentucky, EKCEP generally provides regional programming but has programmatic infrastructure capable of supporting a statewide program. Two support staff are employed by EKCEP to facilitate BHCDP Barrier Relief, with the potential to add more staff as the program expands into new counties and adds participants.

Guidelines

A menu of services was developed based on current assessed needs of BHCDP participants as reported by pilot behavioral health providers. Appropriate financial caps were implemented based on type of barrier relief requested. All referrals for barrier relief services are made by case management services, therapists, counselors, or other qualified behavioral health support staff, or case navigators during emergency circumstances. Appropriate funding restrictions based on the type of Barrier Relief requested and EKCEP staff oversight are applied to each participant referral upon

intake. Funding caps ensure a sustainable future for the Barrier Relief component of the BHCDP.

Current categories for potential barrier relief services include emergency housing, utility assistance, rent assistance, recovery residence assistance, non-behavioral healthcare needs, childcare, basic necessities such as clothing and grocery assistance, and transportation assistance. The current total cap per year per participant is \$2,000.

Participant in Hopkins County, SS, was a veteran having trouble adjusting back into society. He was experiencing PTSD and self medicating. SS started out-patient treatment, however his VA facility recommended him to temporarily go to residential treatment due to relapsing. SB 90 worked in conjunction with the VA’s recommendation. SS thrived at residential treatment where he became a mentor for other veterans. SS recently successfully completed SB 90 and stated he owed his success to SB 90 and was very thankful for the program, and all the assistance it was able to offer him.

Totals

EKCEP was awarded \$280,838 for fiscal year 2024 to directly supply the Barrier Relief component of the BHCDP. As of December 31, 2024, the total amount expended on participant referrals is \$131,264. As exhibited by the spending totals per month, the Barrier Relief component grew month over month as staff and capacity increased and more behavioral health providers began to utilize this service. Referrals also increased as counties were added to the pilot program.

Recovery Residence Support Services (RRSS)



This innovative initiative finds a number of emerging challenges. For example, “what billing code should be used?” A simple decision may take some time to review and identify an appropriate code. Decisions are required regarding which recovery houses can participate. Since recovery houses often do not have licensed professionals, a definition is required for participation. Along with these program parameters are definitions of services to be offered, duration and intensity of services, documentation of services, and outcomes to be evaluated. This pilot initiative will provide valuable data for establishing recovery housing and a social model intervention for individuals with an SUD in developing an innovative VBP service model.

In conjunction with FGI, implementation of RRSS was supported by initial work on defining roles and responsibilities, creating criteria for provider eligibility (see table below), and configuring bundled rates for services/activities. Policies and procedures have been drafted for operations of the pilot as well guides for training and technical assistance of RRSS and its data platform.

The reimbursement procedures of RRSS have been created by developing policies and procedures for providers to submit invoices and receive payment and approval by DMS. In order to monitor reimbursements, quality controls measures were developed through a system for tracking and reporting requests for reimbursement.

Instruments and Outcomes

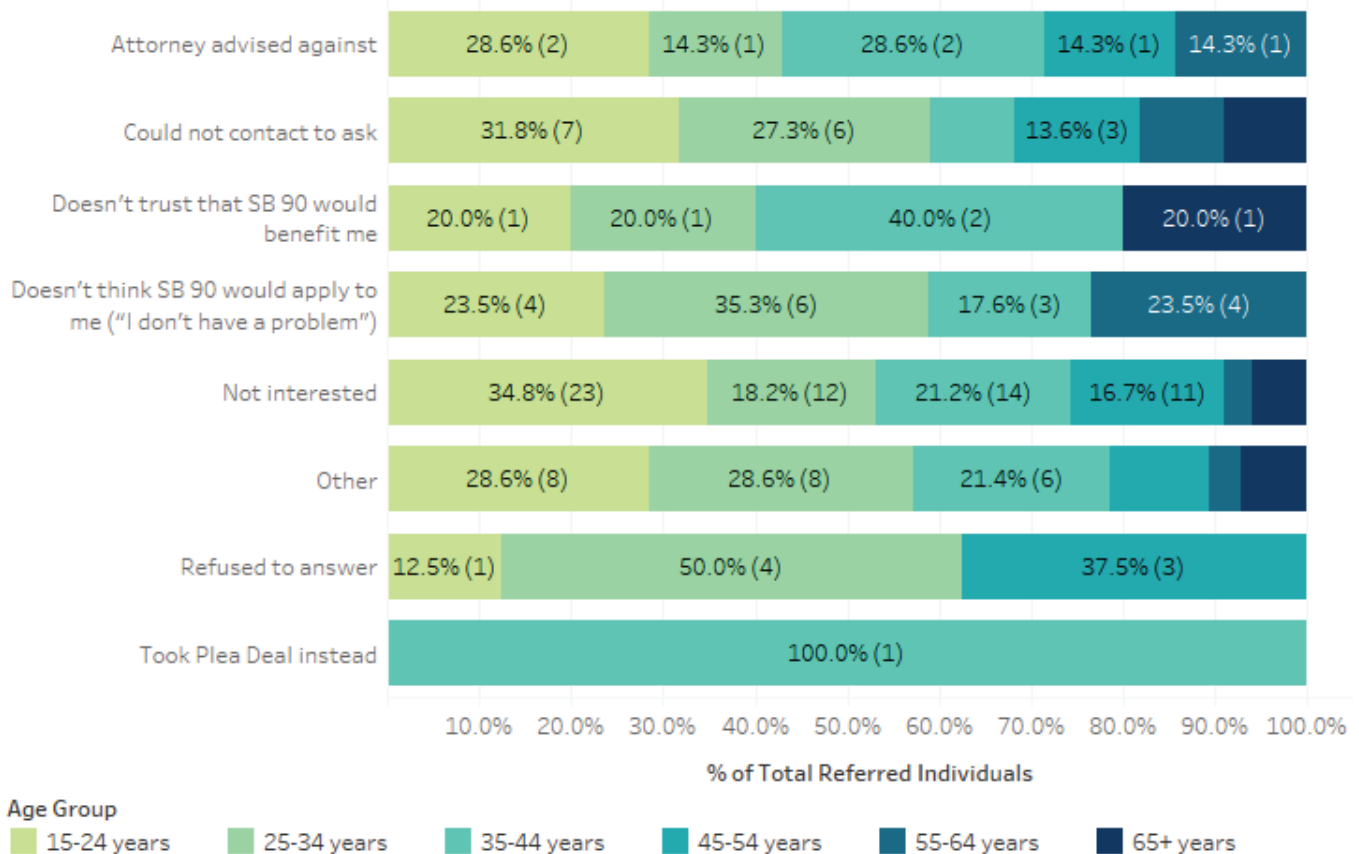
Standardized scales and instruments can be utilized to document outcomes, examples include: Brief Assessment of Recovery Capital (B-ARC 10), Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) Health-Related Quality of Life questionnaire, the Patient Health Questionnaire Scale (PHQ-4), the Alcohol Use Disorders Identification Test-Concise (AUDIT-C), and the Screen of Drug Use (SoDU)



Although KRS 533.272 does not require data reporting on potentially eligible participants who decline either the initial assessment or to enter the program, the AOC realized that this was a valuable data point to capture. Starting in April of 2024, case navigators began tracking the reasons behind why these individuals declined the assessment or to enter the program.

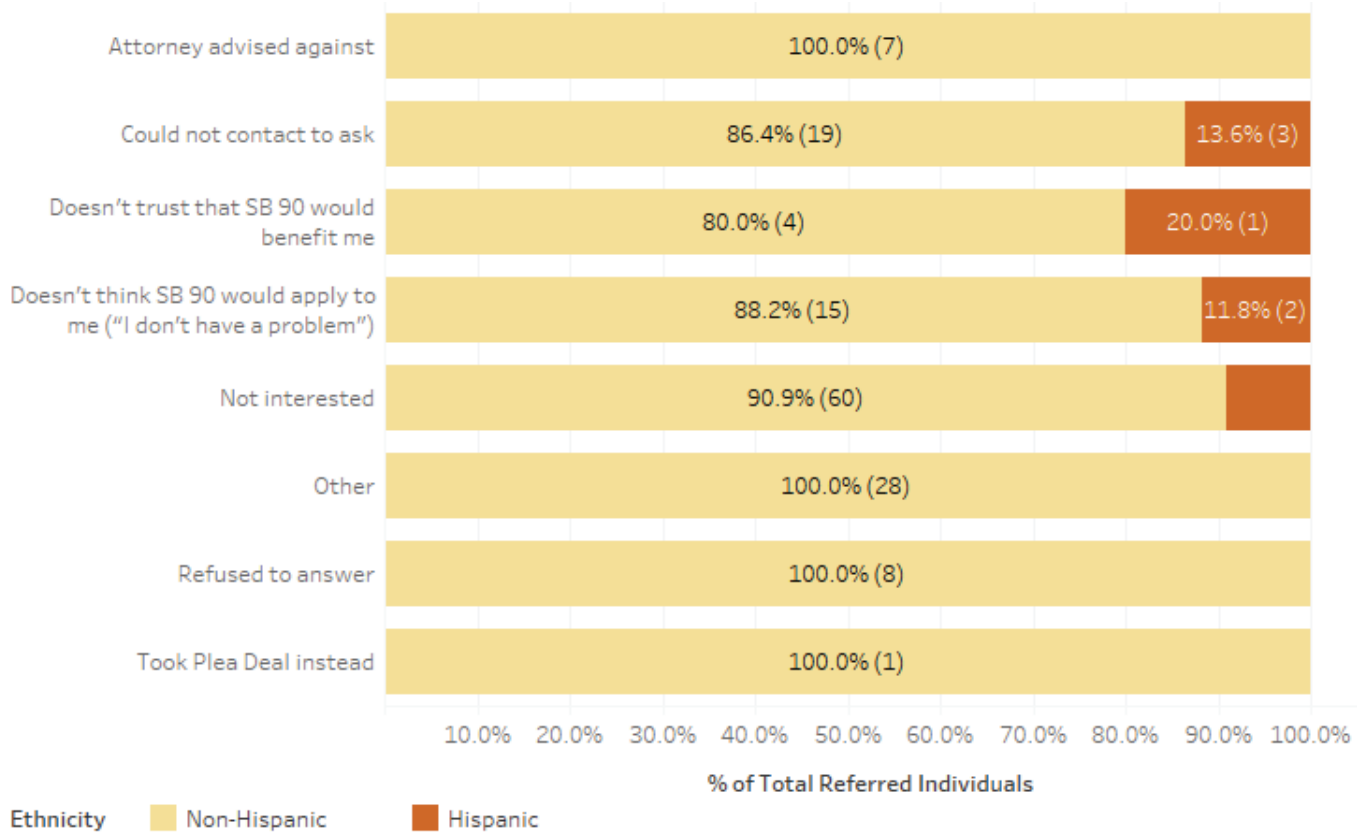
Reason for Declining Initial Clinical Assessment by Age Group

Voluntary Survey Administered 4/18/24-12/31/2024



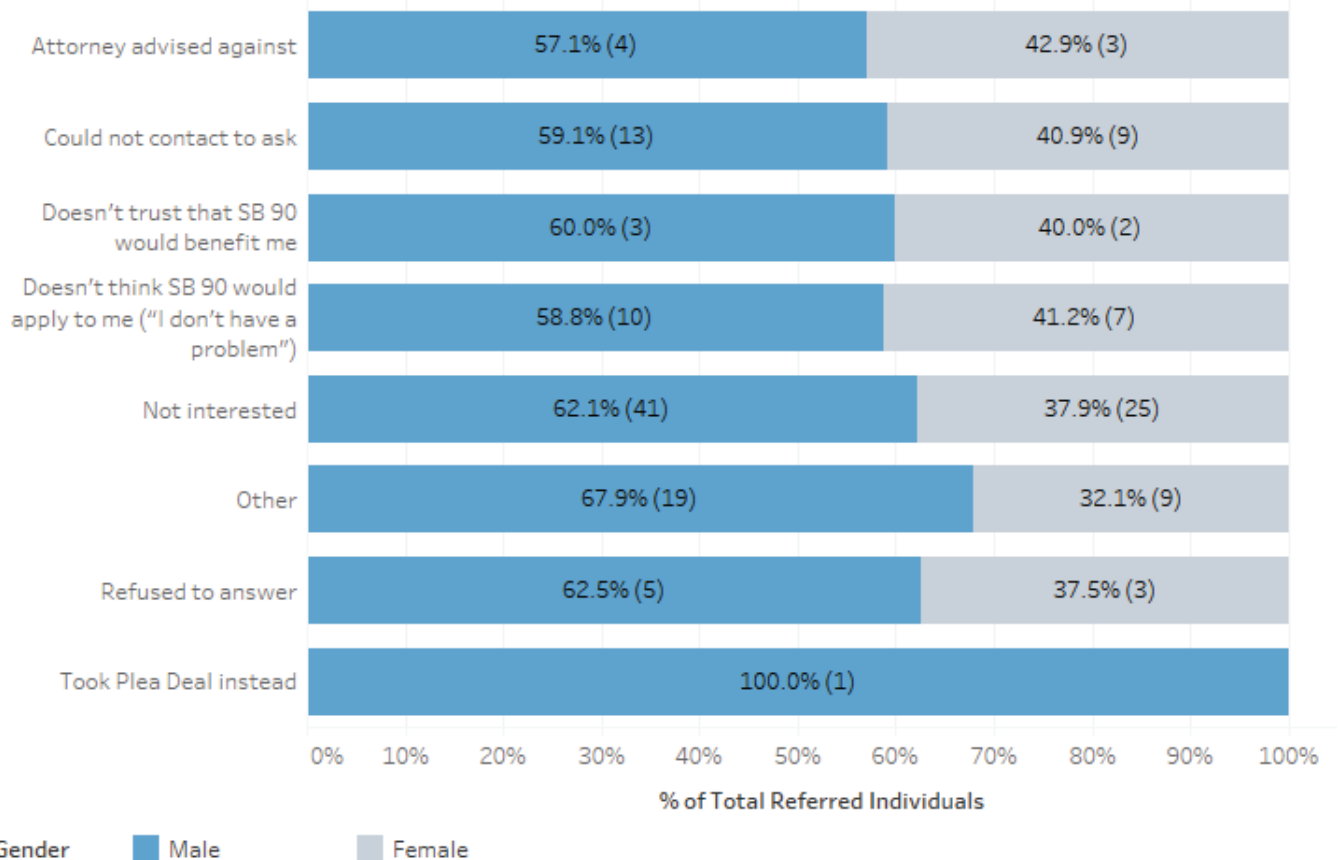
Reason for Declining Initial Clinical Assessment by Ethnicity

Voluntary Survey Administered 4/18/24-12/31/2024



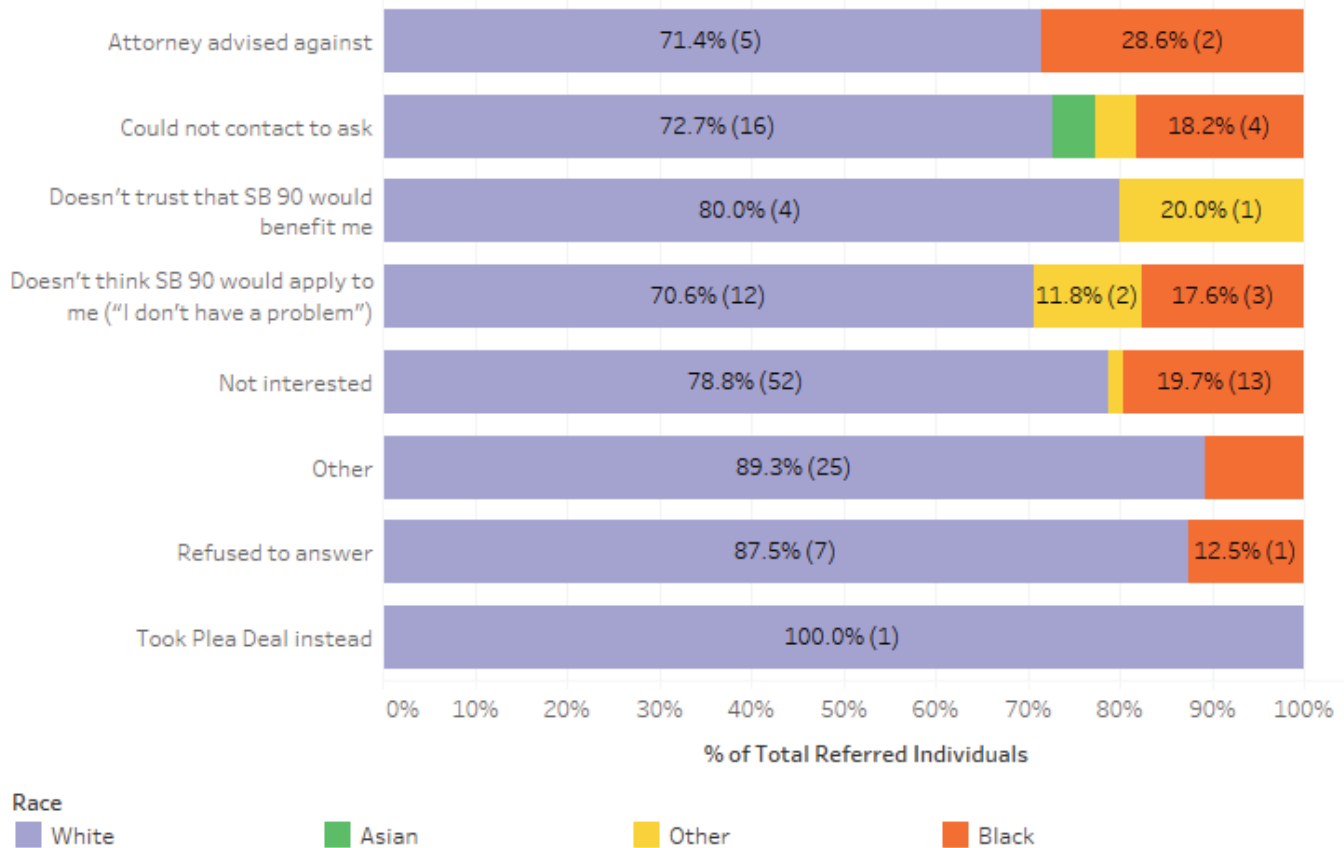
Reason for Declining Initial Clinical Assessment by Gender

Voluntary Survey Administered 4/18/24-12/31/2024

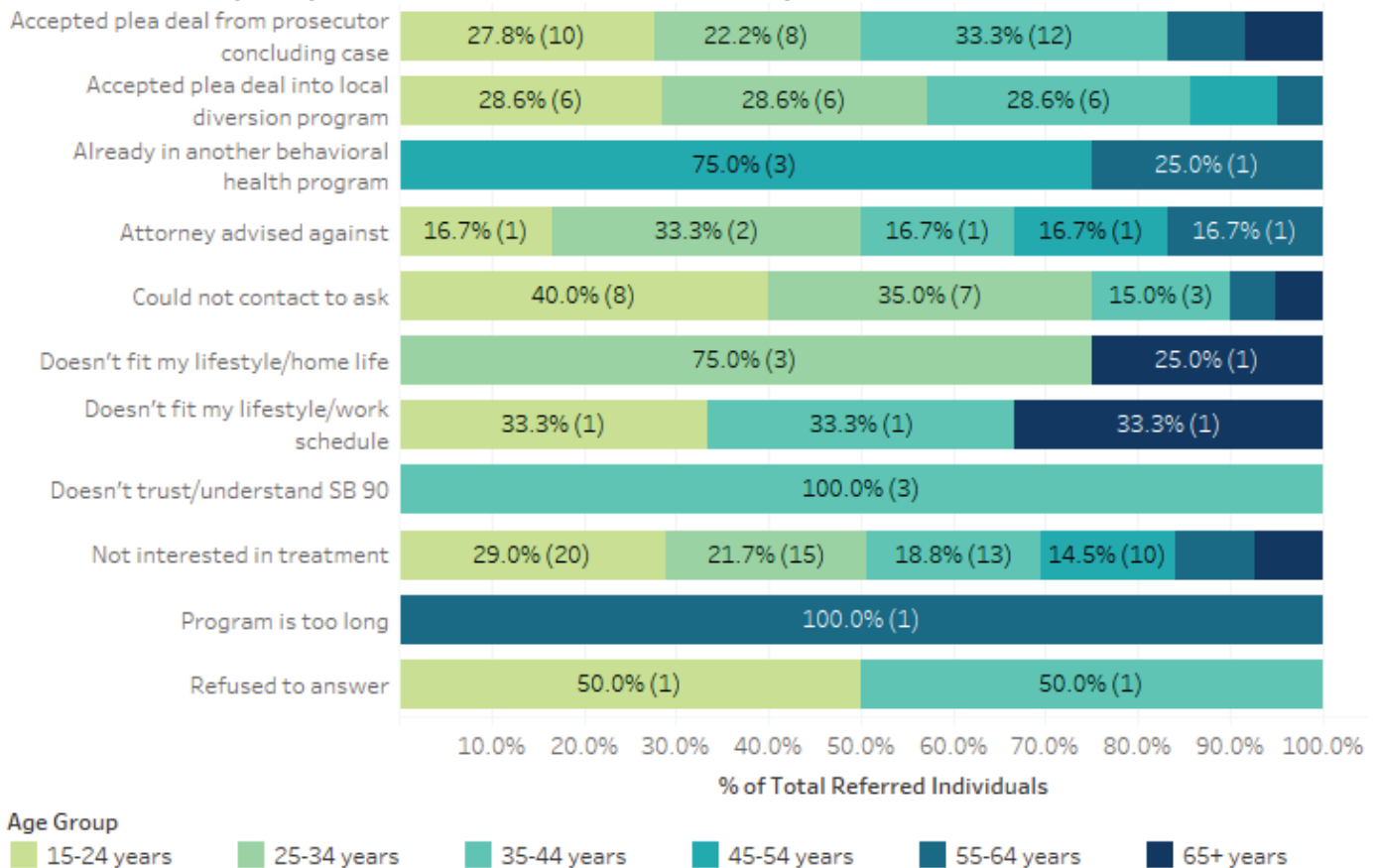


Reason for Declining Initial Clinical Assessment by Race

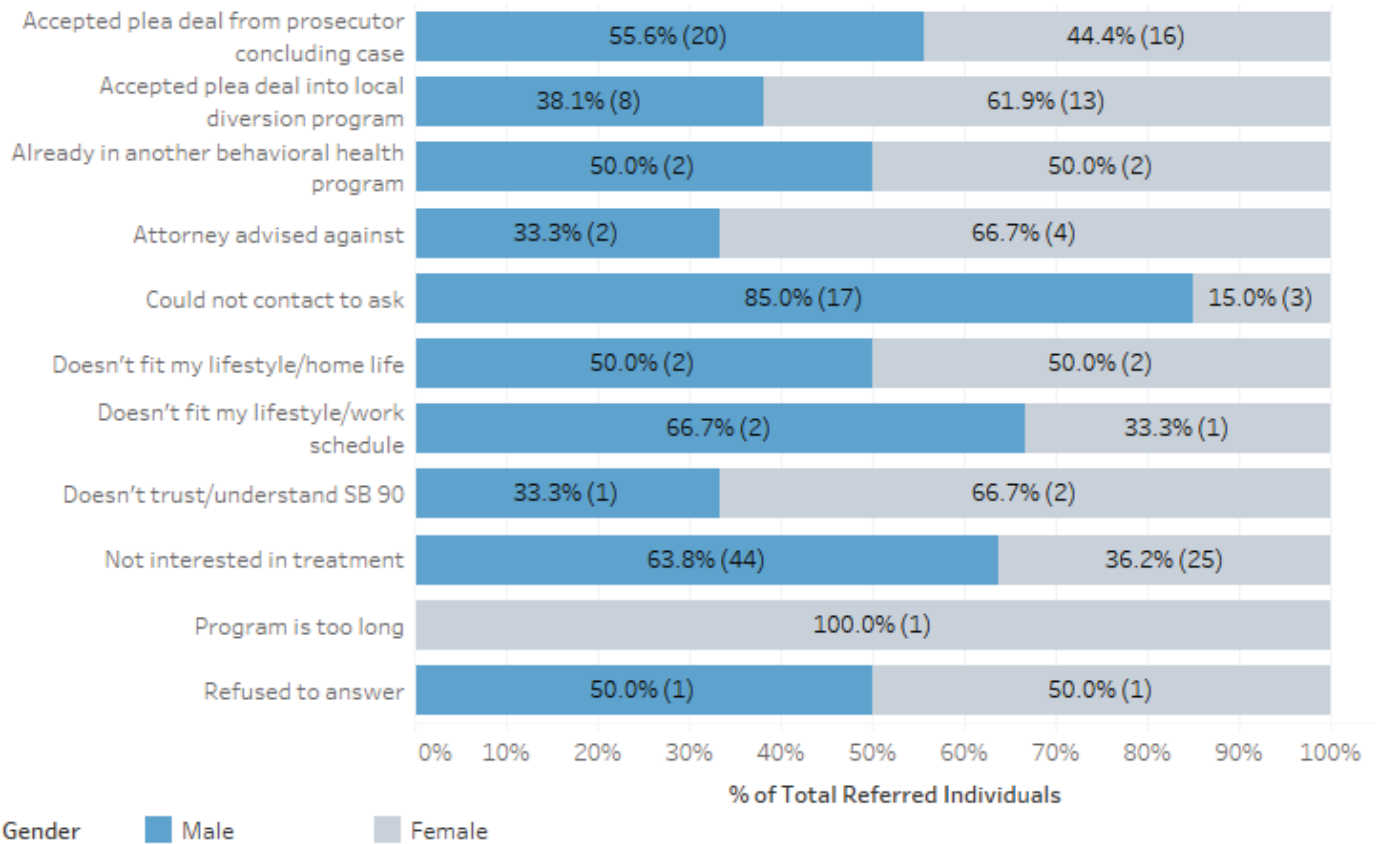
Voluntary Survey Administered 4/18/24-12/31/2024



Reason Given by Eligible Individuals for Declining to Participate in BHCDP

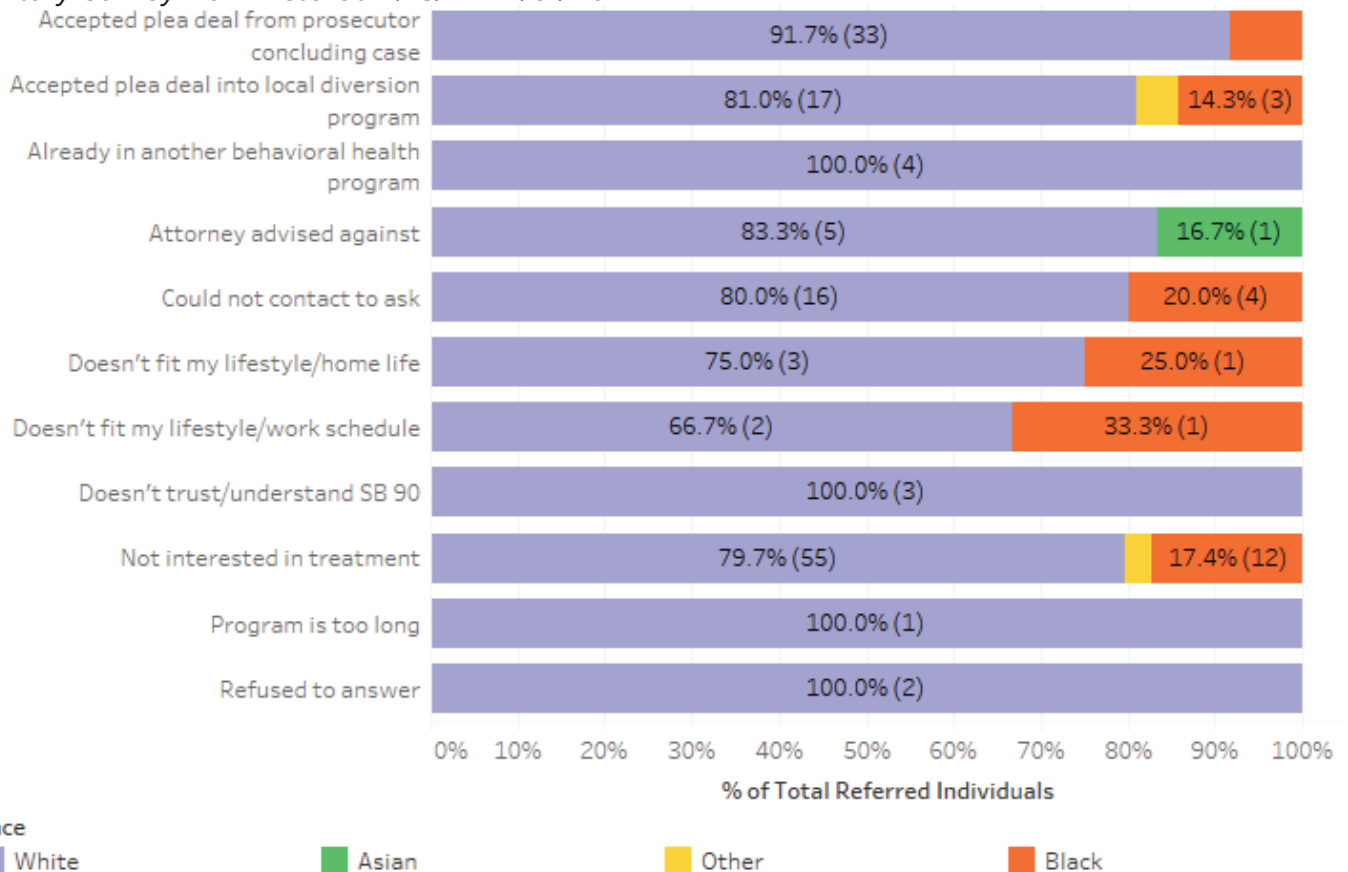


Reason for Declining Participation in Program

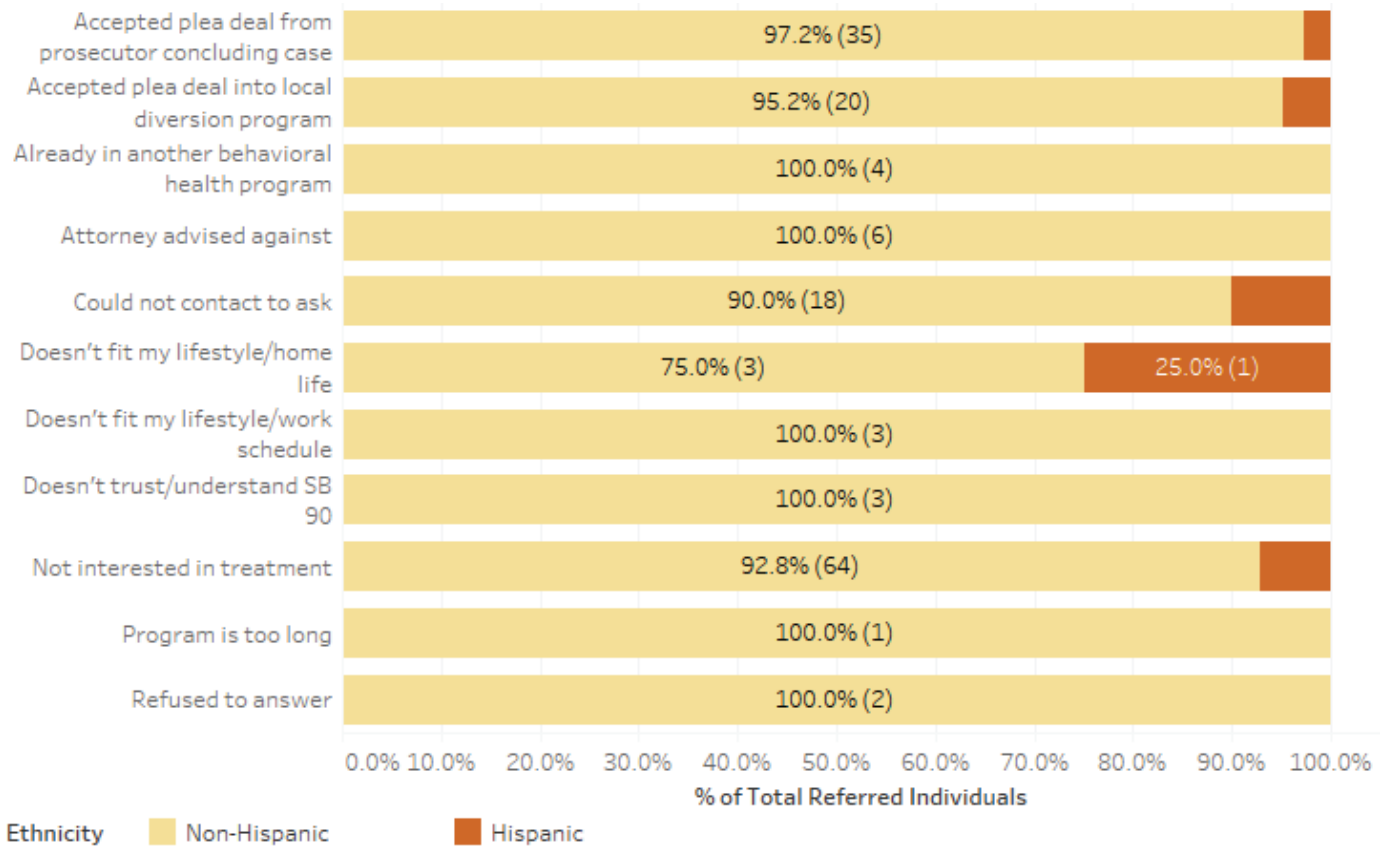


Reason for Declining to Participate in BHCDP

In Daviess County, there is a participant, LC, who once he became SB 90, he was picked up by Henderson Police on a Child Support Warrant. He was again incarcerated, for a month. He told the judge he was doing SB 90, the judge agreed to let him out. He came to see me the day he was released and told me he was job searching and I agreed to speak with some of the second chance employers to see if I could help with his job search. He left my office and got the first job he applied for! He is compliant, positive, and determined to stay out of trouble. He is also keeping his child support agreement, making weekly payments, and is spending time with his children. He has a way to go, but he is doing well today and I believe in him. His grandmother, girlfriend and other family and friends are providing a strong support network for him and that does seem to make a significant difference.

SB 90 has prioritized vulnerable population, including those with co-occurring disorder and homeless individuals. This has led to better outcomes and stability for those in need.

By reducing barriers, SB 90 has empowered individuals to receive consistent, high-quality care tailored to their unique needs. For example, the availability of more comprehensive services, such as therapy, crisis intervention, and case management, has enabled clients to better manage their mental health conditions, leading to improved stability and quality of life. Furthermore, the integration of mental health care with other social services-such as housing, employment support, and substance use treatment-has helped individuals address the underlying factors that contribute to their mental health challenges.

As a result, many individuals have experienced meaningful improvements in their lives, from increased self-sufficiency to stronger relationships and enhanced overall well-being. Often times we are seeing that clients are continuing services even after their SB 90 contract is completed. SB 90's focus on reducing systemic barriers and improving access to care has truly created an environment in which clients can thrive, build resilience, and lead more fulfilling lives.

Glossary

Approved Treatment Providers

Approved assessors for each county participating in the pilot program established under Section 1 of this Act by Department of Behavior Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities (BHDID).

Agreement to Participate

Agreement to participate in BHCDP. Outlines provider chosen and length of the program.

Behavioral Health Disorder

A mental health disorder or substance use disorder, or both.

Behavioral Health Treatment Program

A plan or recovery program based upon a clinical assessment, that: (a) Identifies and incorporates recovery services to meet the specific treatment and recovery goals and the needs of the individual served; (b) Addresses the social determinants of health to include housing, transportation, access to medical care, meaningful employment; and (c) Considers a full continuum of care.

Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP)

Program designed to provide an eligible person who has a behavioral health disorder and who has been charged with a qualifying offense an alternative to receive treatment and recovery support services addressing the behavioral health disorder instead of incarceration, resulting in dismissal of the charges upon successful completion.

Case Navigator

Through the Department of Pretrial Services, the position of Case Navigator was created to bridge the referral process of individuals assessed by a mental health assessor, found to meet the criteria, and agreed to participate in the Behavior Health Conditional Dismissal Program (BHCDP).

Clinical Assessment

An assessment that is performed by a qualified mental health professional in accordance with the most recent American Society of Addiction Medicine criteria for substance use disorder, and the most recent edition of the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders for a mental health disorder.

Court Statistics Project (CSP)

An initiative of the Conference of State Court Administrators and the National Center for State Courts, the Court Statistics Project (CSP) is the only source for an annual national overview of comparable state court caseload data. DMS

Department for Medicaid Services

DBHDID

Department of Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities

EKCEP

Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program

Eligible Defendant or Eligible Participant

An individual assessed by Pretrial Services as a low-risk, low level offender or has been otherwise determined by the attorney for the Commonwealth or the attorney for the defendant as a viable participant in BHCDP. A clinical assessment performed by an approved mental health provider determines if the defendant is eligible/ineligible.

Glossary

Emergency Barrier Relief Funds

Granted through the Opioid Abatement Trust Fund, is the money allocated to relieving the barriers that SB 90 participants may face such as transportation, housing, or even utilities assistance. The Emergency Barrier Relief Funds are requested by participants' case managers and if deemed necessary are distributed by EKCEP.

FGI

Fletcher Group Inc.

Final Report

Report due upon completion or removal from program due to non-compliance.

Findings of Initial Assessor

Report due upon completion of the clinical assessment. Provides recommended level of care and presence of mental health disorder, substance use disorder, co-occurring disorders, or none.

KYAE

Kentucky Adult Education

Mental Health Disorder

A diagnostic term that covers many clinical categories typically including behavioral or psychological symptoms, or both, along with impairment of personal and social function, and specifically defined and clinically interpreted through reference to criteria contained in the most recent edition of the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorder.

Opioid Abatement Trust Fund

The Kentucky Opioid Abatement Trust Fund is a trust and agency account established in the State Treasury to combat the opioid epidemic in Kentucky. The fund consists of 50% of all proceeds received by the Commonwealth, counties, consolidated local governments, urban-county governments, and cities of the Commonwealth in opiate litigation. The fund is distributed as described in subsection (3) of KRS 15.293 and shall not be appropriated or transferred by the General Assembly for any other purposes.

PSA

The PSA (Public Safety Assessment) is an actuarial, data-driven evidence based risk assessment instrument designed to measure the likelihood of a defendant to fail to appear for court or to be re-arrested while released on bail. The risk assessment includes two scales (FTA - failure to appear), and NCA (new criminal activity) and scores defendants as either low, moderate, and high risk for each scale.

Qualified Mental Health Professional

The same as in KRS 202A.011 and shall include a licensed clinical and alcohol and drug counselor under KRS Chapter 309.

Qualifying Offense

A misdemeanor or Class D felony that is not: (a) An offense that would qualify the person as a violent offender under KRS 439.3401; (b) A sex crime as defined by KRS 17.500; (c) An offense under KRS 189A.010; (d) An offense against a victim who has a protective order as defined in KRS 508.130 against the defendant at the time the offense is charged; (e) An act of domestic violence and abuse as defined in KRS 403.720, or an act of dating violence and abuse as defined in KRS 456.010, against the defendant at the time the offense is charged; or (f) An offense against a victim who has an interpersonal protective order issued under KRS 456.060;

Glossary

Quarterly Report

Report due on January 15, April 15, July 15, and October 15 annually. Reports completed individually by qualified mental health provider, Commonwealth's Attorney, and County Attorney. Prosecutor Quarterly Report details demographics of participants, how many participants declined participation, and how many participants were denied participation in the program by the prosecutor. Behavioral Health Provider Report includes level of care, educational and employment training, housing status, and insurance information.

Recovery Services

Rehabilitative treatment services that shall include but not limited to any or all of the following: (a) Outpatient treatment; (b) National Alliance of Recovery Residences or the Council of Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities certified housing; (c) Medication treatment; (d) Personal and family counseling; (e) Substance abuse education and prevention classes or counseling; (f) Vocational training; (g) Literacy training; (h) Community service; (i) Inpatient or residential behavioral health treatment as needed to address; 1. Impaired capacity to use self-control, judgment, or discretion related to behavior; 2. Severe dependence; 3. Special detoxification; 4. Relapse; or 5. Other treatments recommended by a qualified mental health professional; (j) Restorative practices designed to make the participant accountable to the victim when there is an identified victim, and it is safe to do so; (k) Recovery housing assistance; and (l) Recovery housing programs that have an established third party outcome evaluation

Recovery Housing

Refers to safe, supportive, and substance free living environments designed to help recovering from substance use disorders. These residences often provide peer support, accountability, and resources to promote long term recovery. Recovery housing can vary in structure but typically includes shared living spaces, house rules, and participation in recovery programs or activities. The focus is on fostering a sense of community and supporting residents as they transition to independent, substance free living.

Report 1 (14-day Report)

Report due fourteen days after the agreement to participate in the program was signed. Report includes level of care, employment, educational, housing, and insurance status. Report also includes case management services provided by the qualified mental health provider.

Report 2 (42-day Report)

Report due forty-two days after the agreement to participate in the program was signed. Report includes level of care, insurance information, education and employment updates, and case management services provided by the qualified mental health provider.

Senate Bill 90

The Behavioral Health Conditional Dismissal Program signed by Governor Beshear in 2022.

Substance Use Disorder

A cluster of cognitive, behavioral, and physiological symptoms indicating that the individual continues using the substance despite significant substance-related problems (KRS 222.005)

YourPath

Statewide approved qualified mental health professional that completes the initial assessment to determine eligibility.
