

Mobile Treatment Programs

Kentucky Opioid Response Effort

An innovative way to remove barriers to service access, by meeting people in their neighborhood, and providing community-engaged and evidence-based interventions.

Mobile Prevention

Overdose education, infectious disease prevention and treatment; medical assessments for other health conditions, connections to syringe exchange programs, distribution of Fentanyl test strips, Naloxone kits, sterilized water and other prevention strategies.

Mobile Outreach

Outreach to rural and urban locations to serve those who may not have housing, transportation, or who may not pursue treatment at a facility due to cultural, racial, or other stigma as it relates to opioid use disorder, and other social inequities.

Mobile Treatment

Evidence-based care including FDA-approved medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD); Clinical and Medical services; referrals for higher level of care as appropriate; and recovery capital support services such as housing, transportation, basic needs, and mutual aid
