Programmatic Conditions

A. EPA's substantial involvement in this agreement will include technical assistance and other program support, in addition to routine oversight.

B. Joint Evaluation Strategy for Lead Grants

EPA and the grantee will use annual reviews, reports and on site visits for a joint evaluation of the lead grant programs. Both EPA and the grantee will confer on the evaluation. The recipient agrees to inform EPA as soon as problems, delays or adverse conditions become known which materially impair the ability to meet the outputs /outcomes specified in the assistance agreement. The Grantee agrees to submit progress reports semi-annually by July 31st and January 31st of each year, except for the final year of the grant, when the grantee agrees to submit a final report within 90 days after the budget/project period end date of June 30th including the information required by 2 CFR 200.328(b), Monitoring and Reporting Program Performance, and 40 CFR 745.324 (h), and to engage in a joint evaluation of the grant work in accordance with 40 CFR 35.115.

The Performance Reports will:

- 1. Compare the actual accomplishments versus the outcomes/outputs established in the assistance agreement work plan for the grant period.
- 2. Explain the reasons for slippage if established outcomes/outputs are not met
- 3. Provide any additional pertinent information including, when appropriate, information of cost overruns

or high unit costs.

- 4. Any significant changes in the content or administration of the program, implemented since the previous reporting period
- 5. All information regarding lead-based paint enforcement and compliance activities listed at 745.327(d) "Summary on Progress and Performance"

- (b) (1) EPA must ensure that any connections between the recipient's network or information system and EPA networks used by the recipient to transfer data under this agreement, are secure.

For purposes of this Section, a connection is defined as a dedicated persistent interface between an Agency IT system and an external IT system for the purpose of transferring information. Transitory, user-controlled connections such as website browsing are excluded from this definition.

If the recipient's connections as defined above do not go through the Environmental Information Exchange Network or EPA's Central Data Exchange, the recipient agrees to contact the EPA Project Officer (PO) and work with the designated Regional/Headquarters Information Security Officer to ensure that the connections meet EPA security requirements, including entering into Interconnection Service Agreements as appropriate. This condition does not apply to manual entry of data by the recipient into systems operated and used by EPA's regulatory programs for the submission of reporting and/or compliance data.

(2) The recipient agrees that any subawards it makes under this agreement will require the subrecipient to comply with the requirements in (b)(1) if the subrecipient's network or information system is connected to EPA networks to transfer data to the Agency using systems other than the Environmental Information Exchange Network or EPA's Central Data Exchange.
