WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Human papillomavirus (HPV) is a common virus that spreads very easily through intimate skin to skin contact.

Many people are asymptomatic but can still infect others. Primarily spread via sexual contact but can also be spread from mother to child at birth.

SYMPTOMS:

- Genital warts
- Skin warts
- Larynx warts
- Anal lesions
- Itching







Types of Cancers: Cervical, Throat, Anal, Vulval, Vaginal, Penile, Colorectal.

The HPV9 vaccine protects against 7 strains of HPV that can cause cancer and 2 that cause genital warts.

- Two dose series if started between ages 9-14 years.
- Three dose series if started between 15-26 years.
