## What is KEIS?

KEIS – the Kentucky Early Intervention System – is a statewide early intervention system that provides services to children with developmental disabilities from birth to age three and their families. KEIS is Kentucky's response to the <u>federal Infant-Toddler Program</u>. KEIS offers comprehensive services through a variety of community agencies and service disciplines and is administered by the Department for Public Health (DPH) in the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS).

#### Who does Kentucky Early Intervention System serve?

KEIS serves children from birth to age three and their families. Child eligibility for the program is determined in three ways:

- 1. Developmental delay A child may be eligible for services if an evaluation shows the child is not developing typically in at least one of the measured skill areas: communication, cognition, physical, social and emotional, or self-help.
- 2. Established risk concern A child may be eligible if diagnosed with a physical or mental condition likely to result in developmental delay such as Down Syndrome.
- 3. Informed clinical opinion A child may be eligible for services if an approved multidisciplinary evaluation team of professionals determines the child needs services based on the team's clinical expertise.

# **Tracking developmental milestones**

Skills such as taking a first step, smiling for the first time, and waving "bye bye" are called developmental milestones. Children reach milestones in how they play, learn, speak, act, and move. The CDC (Centers for Disease Control) has a way for you to help track your child's milestones via the Milestone Tracker App, or through their comprehensive list of milestones by age. The CDC also provides free resources, books, brochures, videos, social media links, and other detailed information for parents and families to help track a child's developmental stages at every age from birth through high school.

# **Caregiver Coaching**

The Key Principles for Providing Early Intervention Services highlight that "the primary role of a service provider in early intervention is to work with and support family members and caregivers in children's lives." The Kentucky Early Intervention System uses a model of caregiver coaching, because children trust and learn best from the adults who love, nurture, and take care of them. During sessions, early intervention providers support caregivers to choose meaningful priorities, observe caregiver-child interactions then reflect and problem-solve, guide caregivers to practice strategies and activities, and discuss with caregivers to plan how they will continue to work with their children between visits. The goal is for caregivers to feel comfortable and confident to continue working with their little one, so that children get many opportunities to practice within their routines, which helps them to learn and develop.
