New Preparedness Materials Available!

We are pleased to announce that our new emergency preparedness materials are now available for distribution. The new materials consist of the Kentucky Emergency Guide pocket card; Get Ready, Get Set, Know - Preparing for Pandemic Flu brochure; and Be Safe. Be Prepared children's coloring book.

Kentucky Emergency Guide pocket card

The folding pocket card depicts typical emergency scenarios that occur in Kentucky (power outage, tornado, flood and disease outbreak). Pictures accompanying the text describe what to do and what not to do in each situation. There is a section describing what should be included in an emergency preparedness kit, as well as things to grab and go in an emergency situation. The card's text is also written

in Spanish. The card can be filled in with personal contact information, and includes a detachable *I Speak* card for non-English speakers to identify their native language.

Get Ready, Get Set, Know -Preparing for Pandemic Flu brochure

This pocket-sized folding brochure is filled with valuable information on pandemic flu, including what specific supplies you should have in your emergency kit if you have a specific disability.

Be Safe. Be Prepared. Children's coloring book

The new children's coloring book depicts typical emergency scenarios in the same manner as the *Kentucky Emergency Guide* pocket card and describes what should be included in a family emergency kit. In addition, a page reminds children to also take care of their animals. These two sections are unique because both were developed by children residing in Kentucky.

Update on Spring 2007 KOIN Events

Spring of 2007 was indeed a busy season for the KOIN with a nonemergency test drill and roundtable discussions with Area Development Districts (ADDs) and faith-based organizations.

KOIN Non-Emergency Test Drill

A non-emergency test drill was held for the KOIN on March 21, 2007 to test the effectiveness and efficiency of the network for passing information to its members. The drill began at 9:00 a.m. and most replies were received within 24 hours of receipt of the test message. Approximately 40% of KOIN members participated in the exercise. Since the drill, we have updated our KOIN database with current contact information for all members. We are hopeful that our participation numbers will increase with our next drill.

Many valuable insights were learned as a result of the drill such as telling members not to respond during the drill by pressing the "Reply to All" button. We apologize to members who received many email messages from the drill as a result of this occurring.

Roundtable Discussions with Area Development Districts and Faith-Based Organizations


Two roundtable discussions were held on May 15-16, 2007 as an opportunity to gather representatives from both the 15 ADDs and for faith-based organizations in the state. The ADD roundtable met in Frankfort on May 15th. A total of 44 ADD representatives were educated about the KOIN in order to improve and enhance the understanding of the network and its outreach capacity at the community level. On May 16th, 10 representatives from faith-based organizations in Kentucky met in Louisville to begin building partnerships between the KOIN and faith-based organizations.

Individuals attending the events were shown the new KOIN outreach materials, including the coloring book, pocket picture guide and folding pocket pandemic flu brochure.

Vicki Houston and Neeli Langdon of Jane Mobley Associates accompanied KOIN Coordinators Gwenda Bond and Barbara Fox for the roundtable discussions. Valuable insight was gained from both events and we are busy planning future events for KOIN members so stay tuned for updates!

Don't forget about your pets when preparing your family's emergency supply kit. Be sure to include water, pet food, collar with leash or harness, identification tags, copy of current license and vaccinations, bowls for food and water, pet blanket, and any medication that your pet may require.



KOIN is a Multi-Award Winner for 2006!

We are pleased to announce that the KOIN has been the recipient of several awards and recognitions over the past year, three at the national level and one right here in Kentucky.

The awards include:

Gold Award of Excellence in Public Health Communications for 2006 from the National Public Health Information Coalition - This award was presented to the Cabinet for Health and Family Services/Kentucky Department for Public Health for the Prevent, Prepare, Cope informational materials.

Silver Award in the 2006 Greater Kansas City Chapter of the Public Relations Society of America - This award was presented to Jane Mobley Associates for their outstanding work performed in Kentucky with the KOIN.

Promising Practice Model from the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) -

The KOIN was officially recognized as a promising practice among U.S. public health agencies for reaching vulnerable populations during public health emergencies and other natural disasters.

Honorable Mention in the 2006 Kentucky Association of Government Communicators Awards - This award was presented to the Cabinet for Health and Family Services/ Department for Public Health for the Prevent, Prepare, Cope public information campaign.

We are very proud of all of the recognition that the KOIN has received.

Talking With a KOIN Member.....CJ JONES

We are happy to spotlight CJ Jones in this edition of our newsletter. CJ is a valuable KOIN member and works with emergency disaster preparedness planning for the mental health communities across Kentucky. Now let's find out more about CJ.

What do you like about your job?

I feel like I am making a difference in people's lives. They may not see what we do on a daily basis, but when a crisis or disaster occurs, we are better prepared to respond to the needs of people when they are in an extremely vulnerable situation. I also have gotten to attend preparedness meetings all over the state and see first hand the commitment to safety and health services in our communities.

What is your favorite hobby or past time?

I do a lot of mission work with my church. I have been on 10 different trips, some here in the U.S. and others internationally. Since January, I have spent two weeks working with teams from all over the country, rebuilding in New Orleans. Seeing first hand the difficulties people are still enduring after the devastation of Hurricane Katrina has deepened my commitment to preparedness planning here at home in Kentucky.

What is your favorite food?

Macaroni and cheese - traditional southern comfort food, though I have lost 125 pounds in the last two years and don't eat it as often anymore.

Why are you a KOIN member?

I first became a KOIN member when I worked for the Kentucky Office for the Blind as a way to get vital information out to individuals with blindness and visual impairments in the event of an emergency. It is important that vulnerable populations can trust the information they receive and the information carriers more weight when it comes from a trusted, established source. Within six months of joining the Division of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, I was assigned to coordinate mental health emergency disaster preparedness planning with the 14 regional mental health centers. I really appreciate being familiar with KOIN as a part of my new job duties.
