Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 48 members in Floyd County.

#### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$765,995 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 199 households in the past fiscal year.



On average, SNAP supported 9,036 people a month in Floyd County, stretching over 4,366 households.

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## **Health Services**

Funding to Floyd County Health Department: \$1,925,091

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Floyd County received \$840,698 in funding for 1 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 5,460, and 74% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$849,992.

Additional grants totaled \$13,136.

Floyd County received \$495,592 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 167 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,378 children, collecting \$3,065,176 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 2,284 orders.

There were 97 children cared for by foster families, 95 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$8,773.

38% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 61% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

#### Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 12,720 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 74,645 of the 149,557 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 2,012 prescribers and 367 dispenser DEA numbers.

Floyd is located in the Mountain region. This region received \$850,387 in Kentucky Overdose Response Effort (KORE) funding for fiscal year 2024.

The Office of the Ombudsman responded to 472 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2024 in your county.

The Office of Inspector General completed 397 background checks for children & elderly services in Floyd county fiscal year 2024.
