Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Franklin County received \$706,059 in funding for 2 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 7,052, and 54% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$189,472. Additional grants totaled \$0.

Franklin County received \$3,520,928 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 778 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 2,025 children, collecting \$3,385,008 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 1,868 orders.

There were 112 children cared for by foster families, 85 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$4,971.

28% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 71% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).
