**AmeriCorps**  
Kentucky

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 13 members in Hardin County.

### Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$941,725 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 272 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 10,065 people a month in Hardin County, stretching over 4,576 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$20,656,379

During fiscal year 2024, in Hardin county there were 58 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.

## Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Hardin County received \$1,527,252 in funding for 2 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 17,004, and 46% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$407,914. Additional grants totaled \$26,583.

Hardin County received \$5,032,326 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 1,255 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 4,178 children, collecting \$9,072,291 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 3,830 orders.

There were 270 children cared for by foster families, 206 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$13,959.

24% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.  
75% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).
