Kentucky

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 1 members in Lee County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$284,419 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 72 households in the past fiscal year.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)						

Lee County received \$150,965 in funding for 1 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 890, and 86% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$29,800. Additional grants totaled \$6,000.

Lee County received \$292,131 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 72 providers a year. The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 314 children, collecting \$240,304 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 360 orders.

There were 36 children cared for by foster families, 30 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$2,493.

36% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 63% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).
