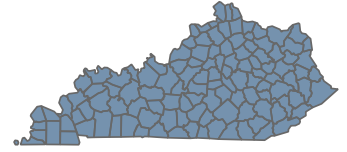

AmeriCorps Kentucky

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 880 members in Kentucky.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Kentucky received \$73,225,462 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 20,354 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 581,083 people a month in Kentucky, stretching over 268,976 households. Total SNAP spending in the Commonwealth in fiscal year 2024: \$1,201,511,309

During fiscal year 2024 1,962 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions.



Kentucky has 106,239 participants who received benefits totaling \$99,086,956.

There are 548 WIC-approved grocers in Kentucky.

Between the start of the HIV Epidemic (1982) and June 2024, there have been 12608 diagnosed cases of HIV in Kentucky.

KPAP helped 6,107 patients in Kentucky with 23,229 prescriptions to save a total of \$54,582,533 in prescription costs.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Kentucky FRYSCs received \$67,839,634 from the General Assembly. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$38,459,717. Additional grants totaled \$1,982,391. The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 628,877, and 61% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch.

The Child Care Assistance Program had \$245,795,287 issuance for all of Kentucky during 2024, supporting up to 50,590 children a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 211,163 children, collecting \$323,106,184 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 202,669 orders.

There were 8,158 children cared for by foster families, 6,618 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$572,694.

33% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
66% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 1,259,479 unique patients residing in Kentucky received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 3,827,708 of the 9,331,220 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of Kentucky received these prescriptions from 39,163 prescribers and 1,681 dispenser DEA numbers.

The Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities awarded \$128,405,598 to the Community Mental Health Centers in fiscal year 2024. In total, 152,563 individuals received behavioral health and/or developmental and intellectual disabilities services and supports in fiscal year 2024.



The Kentucky Overdose Response Effort (KORE) program provided \$31,688,793 in fiscal year 2024 to support a Commonwealth-wide comprehensive, recovery-oriented system of care to address the opioid epidemic in every community in Kentucky.

Public Protection Services

The Office of the Ombudsman had 9,522 constituent contacts in fiscal year 2024 throughout Kentucky.

The Office of Inspector General completed 72,449 background checks for children & elderly services across the Commonwealth of Kentucky in fiscal year 2024.
