Morgan County received \$69,561 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 26 providers a year. The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 422 children, collecting \$567,532 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 389 orders.

There were 40 children cared for by foster families, 35 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$3,273.

2% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
