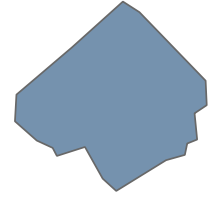

AmeriCorps
Kentucky

Serve Kentucky manages AmeriCorps programs across the entire Commonwealth of Kentucky. 696 AmeriCorps members served 670,641 hours and earned \$2,562,242 in education awards. AmeriCorps members recruited 4,213 volunteers who provided 155,955 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$4,959,369). AmeriCorps members served 74,078 students and provided food support services to 3,344 students. Serve Kentucky also provided housing services to 465 individuals and collected 153,345 pounds of food for individuals facing food insecurity.

AmeriCorps has 9 members in Pulaski County.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Your county received \$1,364,284 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 380 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP supported 11,522 people a month in Pulaski County, stretching over 5,470 households. Total SNAP spending in your county in fiscal year 2024: \$23,149,014

Funding to Lake Cumberland District Health Department:

During fiscal year 2024, in Pulaski county there were 27 people enrolled in Quit Now Kentucky (no-cost tobacco quitline), QUIT Now Kentucky provided 3,947 coaching sessions across the Commonwealth.



Your county has 1,585 participants who received benefits totaling \$1,715,368.

There are 7 WIC-approved grocers in Pulaski County.

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Pulaski County received \$1,196,273 in funding for 3 school district(s). The total student enrollment for schools served by FRYSC was 9,919, and 65% of these students were eligible for free or reduced school lunch. Donations and volunteer time totaled \$430,991. Additional grants totaled \$800.

Pulaski County received \$6,401,525 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance, supporting up to 1,147 providers a year.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 3,342 children, collecting \$4,305,322 in current and past due child support, during fiscal year 2024. The agency established 3,350 orders.

There were 131 children cared for by foster families, 91 of whom received a combined per-diem totaling \$9,170.

30% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption.
69% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data, 20,665 unique patients residing in your county received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 67,547 of the 159,014 total controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of your county received these prescriptions from 3,391 prescribers and 487 dispenser DEA numbers.
