Across the entire state of Kentucky 6,350 Serve KY volunteers provided 29,524 hours of volunteer service (valued at \$803,052) in a little over a year between August 2019 and August 2020.

AmeriCorps members served 28,047 students and provided food support services to 56,877 students. Serve KY also provided housing services to 3,539 individuals.

AmeriCorps has 736 members in Kentucky.

Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (KTAP)

Kentucky has received \$41,480,628 in KTAP issuance. This has been allocated to 18,723 households in the past fiscal year.

On average, SNAP serviced 611,922 people a month in Kentucky, stretching over 283,659 households. Total SNAP spending in FY2021: \$1,454,099,128

Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers (FRYSC)

Kentucky received \$57,376,403 in funding and contracts with 1,031 full-time staff and 145 part-time staff.

As of 7/4/2021, there were 9,170 children cared for by foster families, 7,696 of which received a combined per-diem of \$550,369.

35% of children in foster care had a goal of adoption. 64% had a goal other than adoption (e.g. reunification).

457 child(ren) adopted

Kentucky received \$77,018,930 from the Child Care Assistance Program issuance supporting up to 25,679 providers a month.

The Division of Child Support Enforcement served 45,318 children collecting \$366,164,382 in current and past due child support during FY 2021. They established 7,659 orders.

Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)

According to KASPER data 1,298,415 unique patients residing in Kentucky received a pharmaceutical controlled substance. Opioid analgesics accounted for 4,624,353 of the 10,527,044 controlled prescriptions dispensed.

Residents of Kentucky received these prescriptions from 39,698 prescribers and 1,686 dispenser DEA numbers.

The Ombudsman office had 78,763 constituent contacts in FY2021 in Kentucky.

Office of Inspector General completed 21,641 background checks for children & elderly services in Kentucky.

The Office of the Inspector General reported 149 completed survey(s), resulting in 494 total tag(s) for 107 facilities for Kentucky from 4/1/2020 to 3/31/2021.
